Fruit Stains Removable

Summer means fresh fruit. Fresh fruit means clothing stains. And clothing stains mean grief and trouble for the homemaker unless she is prepared to act promptly and intelligently when a stain occurs, says Mrs. Azalea Sager, extension specialist in clothing and textiles at Oregon State college.

Practically all fruit stains, when they are fresh and still moist, can be removed with boiling or even warm water, she says. After they have dried, they become more difficult to handle, especially the stains from peaches and those with red and purple coloring. Here are some other pointers she gives on removing stains:

As the majority of stains are set by alkalis, it is better to avoid the use of soap on all fresh fruit stains. The color in some materials may be affected by the juice from grapefruit and lemon. If the discoloration is slight the color may be brought back by holding the spot over the fumes from an open bottle of strong ammonia. Or baking soda may be sprinkled on both sides of the color affected, moistened with water, and allowed to stand until the effervescence has stopped, then rinse the spot with water.

On white or washable materials fresh stains are most easily removed by stretching the stained material over a bowl and then pouring boiling water on it from a height of three or four feet, so that the water strikes the stain with some force. A little rubbing alternated with applications of boiling water is helpful on stains in which fruit pulp is present.

If the stain is on material such as silk or wool it is better to sponge it. Spread the stained article right side down on a clean white blotting paper or cloth pad. Sponge with a clean, lint-free cloth (preferably the same material as that stained.) Change both the pad and sponging cloth as soon as it becomes soiled.

CHICAGO OPENS WAR ON CRIME; 200 CONVICTED

CHICAGO, Sept. 2 (AP)—Crime, in Chicago, is fighting with its back to the wall.

And the gangster, the gunman and general ne'er-do-well, apparently is waging a losing fight as the mid-west metropolis' war against crime goes forward with relentless vigor.

Chicago has had many "crime wars" before, but the present campaign—if the number of convictions can be used as a criterion—is making the others seem small in comparison.

Already 200 wrong-doers have been sent to state prisons, and the drive is but a month old. Many others are to follow, if the officials back of the movement, are successful in coming prosecutions.

True, none of the 200 already "sent up" included any of the major figures of the city's underworld, but officials plan to reach them under the state's new law which permits a man's conviction as a vagabond on his reputation as a criminal.

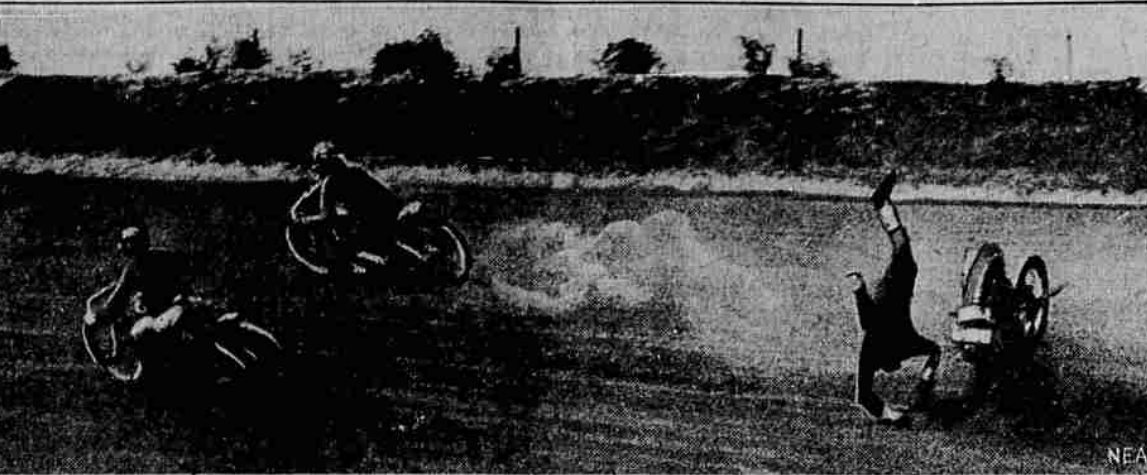
She looks upon men neither as saints nor as sinners, but as human beings, with peculiarities and failings differing from women's only in kind, and often with a compensating tolerance and breadth.

Giants Squelch Boston Braves By Winning Two

The battle of Boston was crucial only to the Braves today.

"Memphis Bill" Terry led a couple of pitching axes yesterday the Redskins couldn't trump, the New York Giants swept both games of a double-header, increased their National league lead to seven games and dropped the Braves into third place, a single percentage point behind the revived Pittsburgh Pirates.

Forty-eight thousand persons—one of the largest crowds in Boston baseball history—looked on with not a little pain as first Carl Hubbel, Jean master of the screwball, and then Fred Fitzsimmons, portly right hander, stopped the Braves' spectacular rush which many Boston fans hoped would lead to just such another pennant as George Stallings' "miracle men" achieved in 1914. The scores were 2 to 0 and 5 to 3.
