

NEW REGULATIONS ON GOLD EXPORT ARE EXPLAINED

WASHINGTON (AP) — Under new regulations issued by the treasury...

The gold will be receivable in the form of bars, kings, buttons, rotor...

All consignments must be accompanied by an affidavit showing the source of the gold...

The regulations said: "When after a delivery of gold on consignment for sale, the mint is satisfied that the same may properly be sold under the provisions of the executive order of August 29, 1933, and these regulations, and that the consignee has fully complied with the same, and after assay, it shall certify to the federal reserve bank in the district in which the mint is located that it has available for sale, in accordance with the said executive order, for the account of the person by or on whose behalf the gold was consigned, the amount of gold shown by such assay, and shall also certify the mint charges applicable thereto."

The said federal reserve banks are authorized to sell such gold, as nearly as may be in the order of certification, to persons licensed to acquire gold for use in the arts, industries or professions, at the price determined by the secretary of the treasury from time to time.

"The said banks shall notify the respective mints of sales made by them. If such gold is not sold upon the day of and the day following its certification to a bank it shall be offered for sale to foreign purchasers by the federal reserve bank of New York."

New Second Hand Store Ordinance Effective Oct. 6

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requires each place to be licensed, sets the license fee at \$10 per annum, requires dealers to keep complete records of all articles bought and of those selling articles to the dealers, and provides that no purchased articles may be resold sooner than seven days after purchase.

Violation of the ordinance is punishable by a maximum fine of \$50, a maximum jail sentence of 30 days or both.

The ordinance will become effective 30 days after passage, or October 6.

General Foods Has Center On Pacific Coast

On the Pacific coast is located one of the three main centers of activity of the nationwide General Foods organization, according to Ralph Whitmore, vice president in charge of sales activities for that company in the far western states.

"General Foods' sales activities, like all Gaud, are divided into three parts," states Mr. Whitmore. "There is a General Foods sales headquarters in the east, another in the middle west, and a third in the far east."

A large number of salesmen in the far western territory work out of eight district offices located in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Seattle, Portland, Butte, Denver, El Paso and Salt Lake City.

Three of the company's nationally known grocery specialties have production facilities in factories in the far west. These consist of a roasting plant for Maxwell House and other brands of coffee, a special processing plant for roasting Sanka Coffee, and a Jell-O factory.

The principal ingredients needed at the Jell-O plant are Pacific coast products. All of the wax paper for Jell-O packages and the shipping cases required at the three plants are provided by local suppliers. Coffee cans for packing Maxwell House, Sanka and other brands of coffee are furnished by far western factories.

Several basic commodities are purchased in the far western states for sale in other territories. The Frosted Foods organization, a General Foods division, appreciates the choice fruits, vegetables and meats that are produced in this section. These are quick-frozen here under the company's Birdseye patents and marketed in other territories.

General Foods recently contracted for the purchase of a large consignment of Pacific coast wheat to be shipped to its flour mills in other sections of the country.

Indirectly, through a substantial stock ownership in The Best Foods, Inc., General Foods is providing additional employment in the Pacific coast mayonnaise plant of Best Foods.

A goodly share in the ownership of General Foods is distributed along the Pacific coast through the widespread holdings of the company's stock. Dividend checks are mailed to 3,000 stockholders in California alone.

These quarterly disbursements are of interest also to the thousands of stockholders, as well as depositors and employees, of leading local financial institutions.

Through warehousing, rail, truck and ship transportation, and many other ramifications of a large business organization, Mr. Whitmore points out, General Foods is responsible directly or indirectly, for the welfare of many thousands of citizens of the far west.

ENGLAND'S BANK STORM CENTER IN BRITISH POLITICS

LONDON (AP) — The Bank of England, mother of the international gold standard and long a dominant institution in world financial affairs, has become a storm center in British politics.

Despite the fact that the bank—long called "the Old Lady of Threadneedle Street"—issues the currency of the realm and handles the bond issues of the British treasury, it has no government appointees on its board. Its directors represent only the old banking houses which own its stock.

The labor party, broken and in all but complete eclipse since the overwhelming victory of the national coalition government in 1931, is now building up a vigorous attack on the bank and the financial interests of "the City," as London's financial sector is known.

Resists Lean Years One basis of the labor antagonism toward the City, according to political analysts, is the fact that it seems to have come through the lean years more satisfactorily than industry. On the whole, it is felt that the white collar worker has fared better than the factory worker.

London's prestige as a financial center suffered a sharp setback with the lapse from the gold standard in 1931, but its star has risen again in the financial firmament. The conservatism of finance is in the saddle, and while leaders of the opposition and while leaders of the opposition call loudly for drastic financial measures, the City has no intention of permitting any steps that may impair its restored prestige.

Hub of British Finance While the New York stock exchange, in its imposing structure at the corner of Broad and Wall streets, is regarded by many as the hub of American finance, in London it is the Bank of England which stands out in the popular mind as the great power.

Its history, its location, and the building which it occupies all contribute to surround it with mystery and awe in the mind of the Londoner.

Since the beginning of the last century, the buildings of the bank, occupying the entire area of one of the largest and most central blocks in the financial district, have been surrounded with a windowless, Greco-Roman wall. And the bank, formed in 1694, had occupied the same site since 1732.

Shows Above Old Wall This impressive wall, with its columns and balustrade, has completely obscured the low buildings of the bank, until a great renovation

and rebuilding project was started a few years ago.

The old buildings were removed, and a handsome new white marble structure has gone up inside the walls, and is now half finished. The white wings of the buildings, set back somewhat from the wall, rise four floors above it to a greenish pantile roof. The building is brought out to the old wall over the Threadneedle street entrance with a massive portico of Corinthian columns.

The entire new buildings of the bank, however, will have less floor space than the tall businesslike, and heavily barred building of the New York Federal Reserve Bank. The classical architecture, with white marble columns and loggia, contrasts sharply with the structure of the New York institution, which with its bars and heavily armed guards resembles a fortress.

Coats of Many Colors No firearms are seen about the Bank of England, despite the fact that it holds the nation's gold reserve, now at record levels.

The guards, or attendants, instead of wearing army style uniforms and carrying big automatics, are dressed in long-tailed lavender coats, bright red waistcoats, black pants and black silk hats with gold braided ribbons.

Gasoline Price Goes Up a Cent Locally

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oils went up one cent Wednesday afternoon, bringing the retail price to 26 1/2 cents a gallon, including state and federal tax.
