GRID OUTLOOK IS FAIR AT OREGON STATE THIS YEAR

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, (Special) — "Our outlook is not bad and it's not good. We have nothing to moan about and nothing to groan about. Nobody will take us seriously until we do something."

Even though Oregon State lost 12 letters from last year's squad, 18 more are expected back in uniform to battle with many other prospects for first string positions this fall.

Left ends: Maynard Schultz, of Corvallis, a product of last year's freshman team; Milton Campbell, of Portland, varsity reserve last year, and Bill Jessup, of Lindsay, Cal., from last year's freshman team.

Left tackles: Bill Tomshock, of Harvey, Ill., a one-year letterman; Tommy Miles, of Honolulu, one-year letterman; John King, of Cottage Grove, reserve varsity center last year, and Stanley Rollins, of Portland, member of last year's freshman team.

Right guards: Stanley McClurg, of Portland, member of last year's freshman team; Vernon Wedin, of Gresham, transfer from Oregon Normal school, and Bill Kenna, of Minneapolis, one-year letterman.

Right tackles: Harry Field, of Honolulu, one-year letterman and Dan Mitola, of Portland, who made his letter at end last season.

Right ends: Vic Curtin, of Portland, a two-year letterman at center and end, and Woody Joslin, of Corvallis, member of last season's freshman team.

Quarterbacks: Harold Pangle, of Santa Ana, Cal., Russ Achenon and Johnny Biancone, of Portland, all three lettermen; and Bob Patrick, signal caller for the freshmen last year.

Left halfbacks: Norman Franklin, of Long Beach, Cal., Willard Jarvis, of Portland and Ed McIntosh, of Hoquiam, all lettermen, and Jimmy Clarke, of Portland, a varsity reserve.

Right halfbacks: Pierre Bowman, of Honolulu, two-year letterman; Ed Makela, of Astoria and Bill Patrick, of Portland, both products of the freshman team.

Basler Expects Fair College Of Idaho Team

COLLEGE OF IDAHO, Caldwell — (Special) — With beginning of grid practice imminent, football athletes at the College of Idaho are preparing to dig out their moleskins and don their cleated shoes for their first season under their new mentor, Coach Loren H. Basler.

"From what I am able to learn," Basler says, "there are a few splendid possibilities left from last year's team. Combining them with several outstanding high school seniors who have indicated their desire to attend the College of Idaho, I believe we will have a really good first year team."

But, as is usual with football coaches at this time of year, he added: "It would be foolish to disillusion ourselves to the extent where we thought that his new, inexperienced material and coach could be anywhere near as good in 1933 as they may be in 1934 or 1935."

Coach Basler is a firm believer that football can only be played when a man on any given team has knowledge and the skill of performing the important fundamentals of the game which he outlined as "blocking, tackling and ball handling."

"Any standard system of offense and defense will be successful if it fits the type of individuals who are to use it," Basler said. "Therefore I have not selected any particular system of offense and defense to be used at the College of Idaho this year."

The Coyotes will open their season September 30 with a night game in Caldwell against Albion State Normal school. On October 13 the Coyotes will entertain University of Idaho Vandals at Caldwell, also in a night contest.
