Menus Of The Day

RECIPE FOR SPICED PEARS
A Dinner Menu
Sliced Cold Ham Buttered Potatoes
Fried Tomatoes
Bread Butter
Blueberry Cobbler Cream
Coffee

Fried Tomatoes
3 firm ripe tomatoes
1 egg yolk
2 tablespoons cold water
2-3 cup rolled crumbs
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
6 tablespoons bacon fat
Wash and peel tomatoes, cut into three crosswise slices. Beat yolk and add water. Dip slices in egg mixture and then in crumbs. Sprinkle with salt and paprika. Heat fat in frying pan and add and brown tomatoes. Cover and cook slowly 10 minutes.

Blueberry Cobbler
(Serving Three)
1 1/2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-8 teaspoon salt
5 tablespoons fat
1/2 cup milk
Mix flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in fat and add milk. Spread this soft dough over berries.

Berries
2 cups berries
2-3 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup water
2 tablespoons butter
Blend berries, sugar, cinnamon and cloves. Add rest of ingredients. Cover with crust, make 3 holes in top. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven.

Spiced Pears
9 pounds pears
7 cups sugar
4 cups vinegar
1/2 cup broken cinnamon bark
1/4 cup whole cloves
Wash pears, peel carefully, cut in halves, remove cores. Boil sugar and vinegar 4 minutes, add spices which have been loosely tied in a white cloth bag. Boil 5 minutes. Add pears and cook slowly until very tender and well glazed, pour into jar and when cool, cover and store in dry, cool place.
Allow spice bag to remain in jar with the pears.

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to take care of his place without assistance.

Additional mystery was added to the case when it became known that his forehead was grazed by a bullet from an unknown source about five years ago.

In general, most of those near the case were of the opinion that the murderer is either a resident of this country or else is familiar with Cove and vicinity. But that is as much as seems apparent, and officers were facing an unusually difficult crime to solve.

COVE, Ore., Sept. 11 (Special)—John Allen, resident of Cove for many years, was murdered in his home one-half mile west of Cove sometime between late afternoon Friday and Sunday noon. The body was found by his son, Royal, shortly after 12:30 o'clock Sunday.

Mr. Allen was bound and gagged and there was a wound on his head, evidently caused by some weapon and which is believed to have caused his death. Royal sent word immediately to the sheriff and coroner.

The kitchen showed signs of a struggle and it was evident, reports say, that Mr. Allen was overpowered there and dragged to another room after he was bound up.

The house had been thoroughly searched and was in great disorder, indicating robbery as a motive for the crime.

Mr. Allen was last seen Friday when at Cove and also he was taken to La Grande Friday afternoon by his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Royal Allen, for some dental work. It is believed the killing took place Friday evening as he was still dressed in his good clothes when found. He had been eating or had just completed his evening meal, as the remains of a meal were found on the table.

Mr. Allen had lived alone in his somewhat isolated home for many years with the exception of a few weeks a year ago when his granddaughter, Marjorie Allen, and her mother, Mrs. Pearl Allen, stayed with him for a part of the summer.

He was much to himself and as his home set back from the road quite a distance and as he had no immediate neighbors, his death passed unnoticed until Sunday, when his son went to see him.

It is thought that he did not have much money about the house or on his person at the time of death, for he had drawn a small amount from the bank before going to La Grande, presumably to pay for his dental work.

A persistent rumor was afloat in Union Saturday that there had been a shooting at Cove, and this has caused a great deal of speculation. This is the first murder in Cove for half a century and people were horrified when they learned of the crime.

Mr. Allen is survived by four sons, Truman, of Lemoore, Cal.; Kermit, of Elmonte, Cal.; Royal, Cove, and Leonard, J. "Doc", assistant 4-H club

leader of Corvallis. All but Truman were home during this summer for a visit with him. The Allens came to Cove from Indiana and the boys all were reared here, and are well known throughout the community. Mr. Allen's former wife, Mrs. Alice Allen, also resides here.

ADMITS SLAYING, WON'T TELL WHY

SANTA CRUZ, Cal., Sept. 11 (AP)—From a 45-year-old nurse, who police said admitted "trailing" Francis Joseph Morgan Grace, Sr., retired capitalist, until she killed him, authorities here today sought a motive for the slaying.

The nurse, Miss Frida Wilhelmina Augusta Wetz, accused of fatally shooting Grace in the garden of his summer home Saturday night, refused to give a reason for the slaying, District Attorney Frank Murphy said.

Murphy said Miss Wetz, who was discharged 18 months ago by Grace from the position as his nurse, admitted she had planned to kill him since that time.

"I had good and sufficient reasons to kill him," the district attorney quoted her as saying, "but I wouldn't tell the reasons to my most intimate friend."

NEW YORK, Sept. 11 (AP)—The flower of American tennis, once flourishing in every climate, was wilted about the edges today and no water in sight.

Frederick J. Perry, dashing young British star, held this country's most coveted title, the national championship, and recovery of the Davis cup seemed further away than at any time since the French captured it at Germantown in 1927.

Perry, hero of Great Britain's successful challenge for the cup at Paris in July, completed his all-conquering campaign with a blistering five-set victory over blond Jack Crawford of Australia in the final match of the championships at Forest Hills yesterday.
