COVE SCHOOL IS WELL UNDER WAY

Good Enrollment in High School and Grades Is Reported.

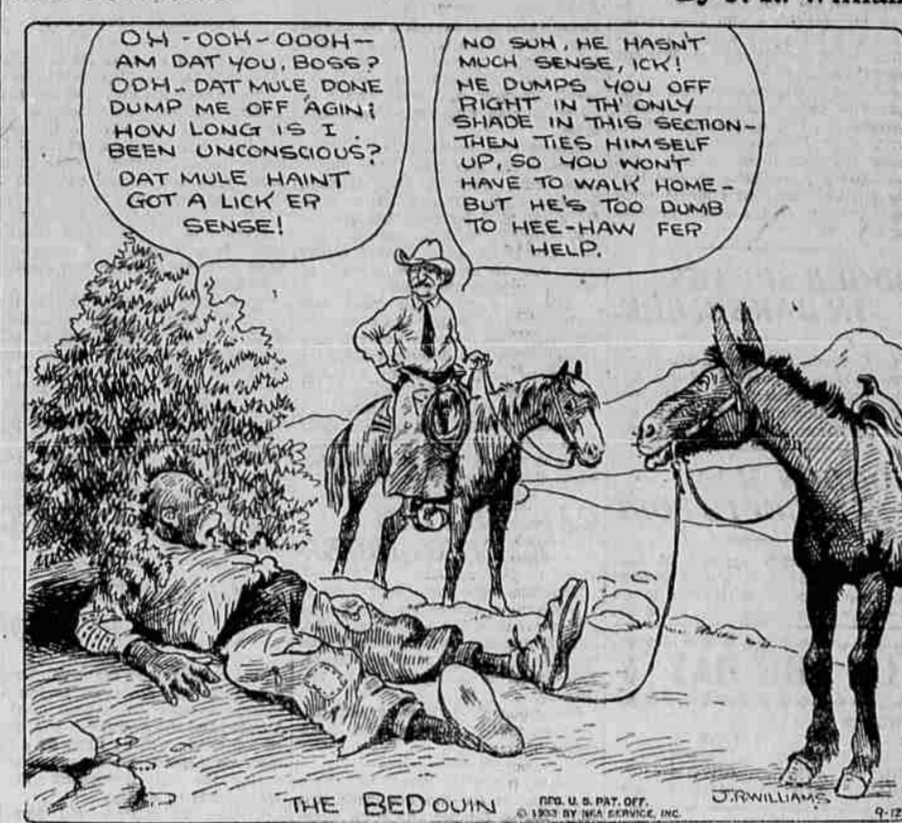
The high school schedule has been re-arranged and curtailed because of only three instructors instead of the four which the Cove school has had for many years. The course, however, is so arranged that all necessary subjects for college entrance are given, making it still an accredited high school. The subjects given are English I, II and III, general mathematics, algebra, geometry, American and world history, economics, French, general science, typing I and II and shorthand II. French was substituted for the Latin course given last year as the foreign language and typing subjects are the only electives. So few students signed for Latin that the typing classes would have been over crowded as there are only a limited number of typewriters available.

The usual athletics for boys and girls will be given with Mr. LaViolet in charge of the boys' athletics and Mrs. Coad in charge of the girls. Cove High school students participated in four major athletics, football, basketball, baseball and track, and have held their own very creditably against schools of larger attendance. Chorus work will also be part of the high school work and will be under the direction of J. B. Price.
