

Enrollment For Union Hi School Increased By 29

UNION (Special).—The first day's enrollment of 144 in the Union High school indicates that the attendance this year will be larger than for several years past. Monday's registration exceeded that of the first day last year by 29 and Superintendent Roy Conklin expects the attendance to pass the 175 mark. The grades registered 241 the first two days, showing an increase of 9 over last year. As a result of the action of the new non-high school district Union drew 19 students from Ponderosa, most of whom attended the Baker high school last year.

Much work was done on the Medical Springs-Union road last year and it is in excellent condition with a new gravelled surface. A bright new orange-colored bus with a capacity for 30 passengers is used in bringing the pupils from Ponderosa, Catherine Creek and The Park and by the time all of them are gathered up there is no room to spare. Harry Amell, of Union, has the contract for transportation.
