Light Yield Is Reported From Irrigated Farms

WALLOWA (Special)—Threshing of crops in irrigated parts is starting this week. The spring sown grain on irrigated land has ripened slowly since the weather became cooler and threshing will be rushed as rapidly as possible. Gilles Plas was moving his stationary outfit to Grover McClean's in Middle valley where he started threshing Wednesday and will also thresh a number of other jobs in that community. The Allen boys of Middle valley are threshing in the Dry creek section and a run of a few days more will finish all the threshing in that section. Generally light yields of wheat from most of the dry land farms are reported ranging from ten to a little better than 15 bushels per acre with an occasional crop running some better than this figure.
