UVALDE, Tex. (AP) — Far from the hubbub of Washington with its problems of national recovery and international affairs, Mr. and Mrs. John N. Garner have been spending a quiet summer holiday in their Uvalde home.

So casual is the vice president of the United States about his official duties that fellow townspeople have to pinch themselves occasionally to realize he is really right here in their midst.

Usually Found At Home  
Garner has been here ever since congress adjourned. He has rarely left his home, nestled in a clump of pecan trees, except to go on a fishing jaunt or a hunt with some hounds recently given him.

There is a good deal of telephoning and telegraphing from the Garner home, however, to say nothing of the work that goes on in a little frame structure only a few steps from the comfortable house where the Garners live. The Garner "offices" are in that building.

Mrs. Garner handles letters  
Mrs. Garner has had time to do little except superintend the vice president's correspondence this summer, for she is his secretary. She is aided occasionally by her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Tully Garner, whose home adjoins the vice president's summer "white house." Sometimes she goes to a home town bridge party or to church, and on shopping trips "down town," but it's all done without show.

Garner has refused steadfastly to make any public speeches, although Texans have sent him hundreds of invitations to appear at barbecues, picnics and other events.

A diversion from his regular program of seclusion was his initiation into the Uvalde lodge of Odd Fellows. The occasion of his "riding the goat" drew members of that fraternal organization from great distances, the first time some of them had been "to lodge" in many months.
