A. Schilling Co. Sues A Denver Firm For Slander

DENVER, Colo.—Damages of \$50,000 for slander, are sought in a suit filed in the United States district court here today against the Morey Mercantile company, wholesale grocers of Denver, by A. Schilling & Company, manufacturers of coffee, tea, baking powder, spice and extract, of San Francisco. Suit was filed in behalf of the Schilling company by Grant, Ellis, Shaffroth and Toll. This action is based on alleged false and slanderous statement, declared to have been circulated by the Morey Mercantile company to the grocery trade concerning the ownership of the Schilling organization.

The suit alleges that on July 6, 1933, the Morey Mercantile company, caused to be circulated on charge sheets to its representatives the statement that control of the A. Schilling & Company had passed to the Safeway Stores Inc. The suit further alleges that in connection, the statement was added that "perhaps some of the merchants who buy from the Schilling company would be interested in knowing where their money goes." These statements, the suit alleges were "widely, industriously and continuously spread among the retail grocery trade."

Denials of the authenticity of the statement that control of the A. Schilling & Company had passed to Safeway Stores Inc. were given to the Morey Mercantile company, according to allegations in the complaint, together with a request that the original untruthful statements be withdrawn and corrections made. The suit alleges that as late as the middle of August, the untrue statement was continuously being spread among the retail trade, especially in New Mexico.

The Schilling company, in substantiation of its complaint declares its business has been injured and damaged, "because of the belief in the statement so made by representatives of the Morey Mercantile company."

The company alleges it was organized in 1881 by August Schilling and George F. Volkman, was incorporated in 1906 and has at all times been owned, controlled and operated by the Schilling and Volkman families.

White House Is Sad; Ike Hoover Dies Suddenly

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15 (AP)—The White House is sad today. "Ike" Hoover is dead.

More than 40 years ago, Irwin H. Hoover went into the executive mansion to install those "new fangled" electric lights. Last night he waved farewell to friends in the executive offices and went home to die, at 62, from a sudden heart attack.

During his many years at the White House "Ike" filled the nation's most unique office, that of major domo to the presidential household.

President Roosevelt said "all of our family are deeply distressed" at Hoover's death. He termed his passing a "tremendous personal loss."

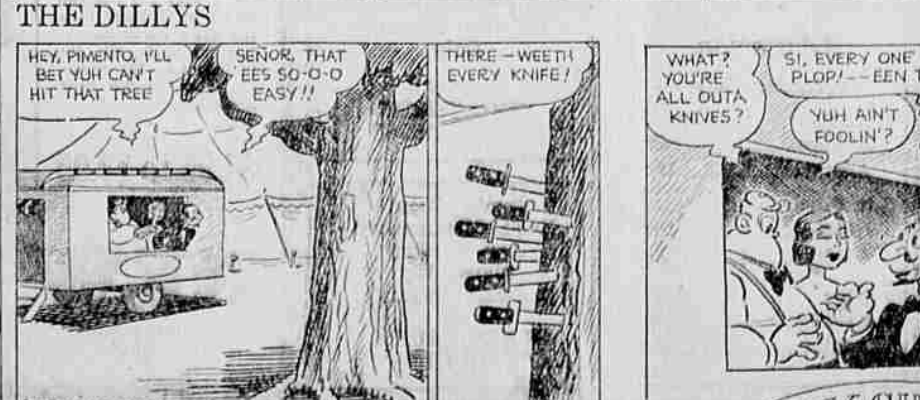

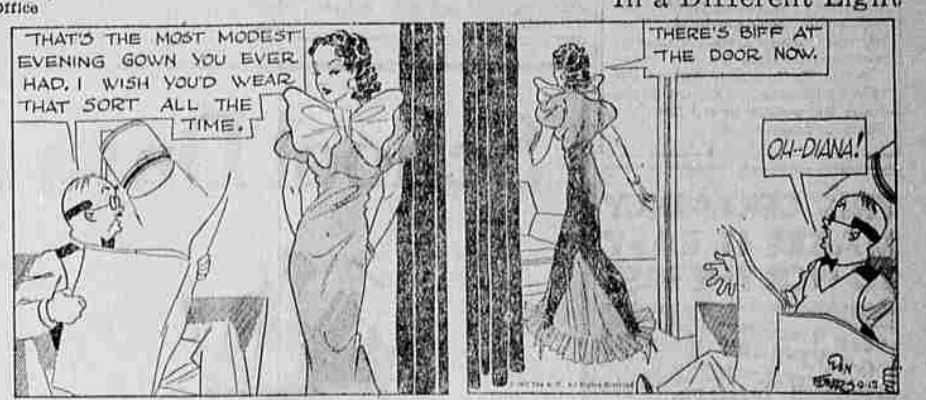
