merchants now are beginning to feel the benefit of the increased employment and the higher earnings of the working classes.

"Of dominant importance in the trade news this week," says today's review, "was extension of the sustained buying movement to more remote ramifications of the elongated line which the business front now has assumed."

"The bulkier aggregate of distributive totals did not afford the sole sustaining factor to the spread of assured confidence in the potential betterment as these were reinforced by improved earnings statements from the second quarter and the first half of the third which revealed profits in encouraging contrast to the rate of losses which were general in the first quarter."

West Coast Lumbermen's association. Lumber production increased 100 percent from April to August, while sales during the same period advanced but 20 percent, the assemblage was told by Col. W. B. Greeley, secretary-manager of the association, as he warned them of the necessity of stabilized production.

"Since that period, there has been a drop in production, but we are still producing 25 per cent too much," he continued.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 15 (AP)—New business amounting to \$6,585,000 feet, or about 1 per cent below the previous week, was reported by the Western Pine association here today for the week ending September 9. The total was about 20 per cent under the three-year weekly average for September. Of 123 mills reporting, 77 were operating.

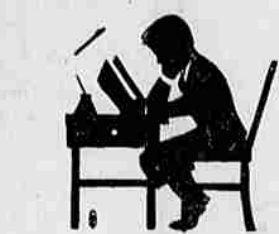
Most of the peach crop in the Ocala country was killed by late frosts, but Labadie's trees were unharmed.

BUTTER TRADING IS MORE ACTIVE

PORTLAND, Sept. 15 (AP)—Slightly more active trading in butter was reported by the trade here following the declines ranging from 1c on 89 score to 2c on 92 score yesterday. Top score was quotable here at 20c.

Butter receipts continued heavy here amounting to 88,346 pounds in the past week as compared with 65,800 in the previous week and 63,192 pounds a year ago. There was plenty of fresh stuff for the trade. The market was reported only about steady.

Considerable into-retail movement of eggs was reported. The market generally was active in all its phases and steady at present price levels. Receipts were barely able to meet the demand. In the week ending Wednesday receipts here amounted to 2,040 cases as compared with 2,444 cases in the same week a year ago. Prices were unchanged.

OPIMUM SMOKING IN HAWAII REPORTED TO BE ON WANE

HONOLULU (AP)—Hawaii Chinese still smoke their opium, but the practice is diminishing. This, says C. T. Stevenson, head of the federal narcotics bureau, is because the older generation dies or returns to the Orient and the youthful Chinese do not acquire the habit.

Stevenson estimates that consumption of smoking opium in Hawaii has declined from 3000 5-tael cans monthly in 1921 to 500 cans now.

HOME LOAN BONDS REPORTED QUOTED AT 93 IN MARKET

Explanation of the bonds which are provided by the Home Owners Loan corporation to be given to mortgagees for the face of their mortgages when loans are made to home owners, was made today by C. J. Shorb, La Grande district manager.

He stated that according to latest word from the New York bond market the bid on these bonds, not yet issued, is 93 with the holding price at 94. "These bonds are acceptable by the Federal Reserve bank, the Home Loan bank and the public works division of the reconstruction finance corporation, as collateral security for a loan of 80 per cent of their value," Mr. Shorb said. "These bonds, he said, are secured by first mortgages on real estate. The four per cent interest payable semi-annually, is guaranteed by the federal government."

The bonds also are acceptable as security for the deposits of postal savings funds in bank, according to information received from James A. Farley, postmaster general.
