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12 GO ON TRIAL IN KIDNAP CASE

HELM TAKEN TO HOSPITAL IN PORTLAND

Condition Reported As Not Dangerous; Accident Occurs Near Hood River

MRS. HELM CUT OVER HER EYE

Two Helm Boys and Sheriff Jesse Breshears Escaped With Minor Bruises and Cuts.

District Attorney Carl Helm, of La Grande, is in a hospital in Portland today, painfully injured as a result of an automobile accident five miles west of Hood River Saturday afternoon about 3:30 o'clock. His condition today was not reported as dangerous.

Mr. Helm, who was driving his new car, struck the steering wheel with his head at the time of the collision. Two front teeth were knocked out, another one broken, his lower lip badly cut, his knee cap crushed, and his chest injured.

Mrs. Helm and their two sons were in the back seat. She was thrown against the back of the front seat, and suffered a gash over her eye, which required several stitches to close. The boys escaped without injury.

Sheriff Jesse Breshears, who was in the front seat of Mr. Helm's car, was thrown against the windshield, breaking it, but he escaped with minor bruises and cuts. He returned to La Grande last night.

According to the sheriff, Mr. Helm's car and a light coupe collided head-on on a curve. Both were going at a moderate rate of speed, but the crash badly damaged both machines. A woman driving the coupe suffered a

A jury panel for the October term of circuit court, which will begin during the first week of next month, has been drawn at the court house, it was announced today.

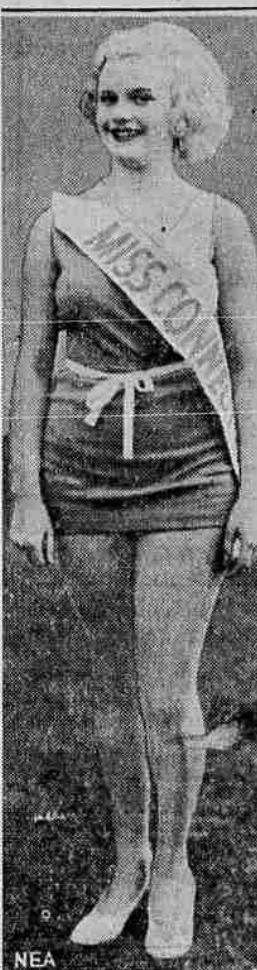

Season to Begin Wednesday Morning, to Continue Until Evening Oct. 25.

GROUSE SEASON IS NEARING END

Pheasant Shooting Not to Begin Until Oct. 15 — Duck Season to Open on Oct. 16.

Deer hunters of Oregon, with enough rain the last week to suit them, are eagerly awaiting for the opening day of the fall hunting season. Next Wednesday morning, the annual "war" against the fleetfooted will be on, to continue until sundown Oct. 25.

The bag limit this year is one mule deer or two Columbia blacktail deer. Hunting is expected to be good, reports say.

The season is open in all of Union county except the Mt. Emily game preserve and any other game preserves that exist.

The grouse season comes to a close Wednesday in Union, Baker and Walla Walla counties. Next open season will begin Oct. 15 with shooting of Chinese pheasants, and on Oct. 16, the duck season will begin. The elk open season will start Oct. 23 and end the evening of Oct. 25, coincident with the close of the deer season.

Local game officials expect best hunting for deer in the Porcupine, Ladd, creek and upper Grande Ronde river sections.

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HURRICANE NEARS COAST OF MAINE

A hurricane, runaway madcap from the tropics, sent gales raging toward Maine's coast today after wreaking death and destruction on other parts of the Atlantic seaboard.

Fourteen persons were known to be dead in North Carolina, where the storm struck its most vicious blow. Property damage there approached \$3,000,000. Two persons were drowned in Pennsylvania. Massachusetts suffered a buffeting yesterday. Wharves were wrecked, shipping disrupted, highways flooded. Steamboat service between Nantucket and the mainland was stopped.

The price of local cash wheat stood today at about 35 cents bulk, according to quotations at the Pioneer Flouring Mills.

CHICAGO, Sept. 18 (AP) — Wheat soared today to more than 13 cents above last week's low, but at the finish showed only slight fractional gains for the day.

Inflation talk based largely on a point quotation of \$31.44 an ounce today against \$30.49 Saturday, together with a steep rise in British exchange, had much to do with the rise of grain. However, general desire for quick profits acted at times as more than an offset later.

Wheat closed steady, at the same as Saturday's finish to 1/4c higher, corn 1/2c down, oats unchanged to 1/4c up, and provisions 10 to 30c advanced.

PORTLAND'S ROAD DEMAND WILL BE ANSWERED SOON

SALEM, Sept. 18 (AP)—The Oregon state highway commission's answer to the demand of Portland for an additional \$1,000,000 federal funds allotted to the state for allocation in Multnomah county, will be issued from here either today or tomorrow, Chairman Leslie M. Scott, chairman of the commission, announced today.

Following awarding of more than \$552,000 road jobs late Saturday, the commission set dates for the next six meetings at which time it was expected contracts ranging from a half million to one and half million dollars, would be let each time. The first meeting will be held October 5 at which time about a half million dollars in jobs will be let.

HAVANA, Sept. 18 (AP)—Provisional President Ramon Grau San Martin predicted today that a solution of Cuba's political crisis would be reached before the afternoon was over, and indicated he might surrender the presidency.

BAILEY AND OTHERS WILL FACE JURORS

Desperadoes Kept Under Heavy Guard in Oklahoma City Court Room

NO RANSOM MONEY FOR LAWYER'S FEES

Prisoners Charged With Participating in Abduction of Charles F. Urschel, Millionaire.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Sept. 18 (AP)—In a courtroom filled with armed guards, the first panel of 12 jurors was called today to be examined for service in the kidnap trial of Harvey Bailey and 11 others accused of participating in the abduction of Charles F. Urschel, Oklahoma City oil millionaire.

The chief defendants, Bailey, Albert Bates, R. G. Shannon, his wife and his son, Armon, were kept under heavy guard in an iron barred "bull pen" on the floor below the federal tower courtroom, until the jurors filled the box and the methodical propounding of routine questions began.

Bailey and Bates, handcuffed together, were brought in as Judge Edgar S. Yaught asked the usual questions of all the jurors.

The two desperadoes were kept standing several minutes while this formality was completed. As the trial opened, Joseph B. Keenan, assistant United States attorney general, warned that lawyers accepting any part of the Urschel ransom money as fees or money obtained in transfer of the ransom currency would be prosecuted to the full extent of federal law.

"We do not propose to permit attorneys, bondsmen, fixers or anyone else to get by with a wink, with any manipulations in this kidnaping. We are here to prosecute everyone whose hands are not cleaned."

Even Keenan was searched as he entered the federal building.

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Governor Meier Is Requesting Starr To Resign

PORTLAND, Sept. 18 (AP)—Governor Meier late today said he was asking C. L. Starr to resign as president of the state board of higher education. The governor said a letter to Starr calling for the latter's resignation was to be dispatched from the executive office at Salem later today.

He said he did not wish to give out any part of the statement until the entire letter was released.

Lamson Jurors Black and Blue After "Falling"

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 18 (AP)—The Examiner in a copyrighted article today said members of the San Jose jury which convicted David A. Lamson of murder tried falling against furniture to test the defense accident theory.

The article, under the signature of George H. Hegerich, a member of the jury, said one member "held out" at first for the possibility that Lamson's wife may have fallen, as the defense contended, in the bathroom of the Stanford campus home.

"To try this out," the article said, "we constructed a 'bathroom' in the jury room with chairs and desks.
