A "New Deal" for Family Menus

WITH the "New Deal" moving toward its goal, with recovery on the lip of everyone's tongue, and hope bright for the future, the wise housewife will realize that in no unobtrusive way as the planning of the family menu she can contribute materially to the maintenance of that individual morale which is the foundation of the whole recovery program.



Man can exist for a time by bread alone, but it is a spirit-deadening diet. So must be any menu that drifts into the rut of monotony, or that lacks the little delicacies and luxuries that give it zest. The stringent exactions of economy may have led to a cutting down of desserts and elimination of other delicacies. If so, they should be restored as soon as can be.

These are the features that enable a meal not only to satisfy man's purely physical needs, but also the more intangible requirements of his spirit. They are the features, therefore, that contribute most powerfully to the full enjoyment of the present, and to the building up of hope and confidence in the future.

let stand 10 minutes. Dissolve gelatin in boiling water, add salt, and pour over peaches, stirring occasionally as mixture cools. Chill until slightly thickened. Turn into cold pie shell. Chill until firm. Cover with meringue.

Put egg whites, sugar, salt, and water in upper part of double boiler. Beat with rotary egg beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water, and beat 1 minute; then remove from fire, and continue beating 2 minutes longer, or until mixture will stand in peaks. Add flavoring. Beat well. Spread over top of pie.
