PLANS TO START "BUY" CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 (AP)—President Roosevelt signed the long sought code for the bituminous coal industry late today.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18 (AP)—An early start was sighted today on the nationwide "buy new" campaign projected by Hugh A. Johnson, NRA chief, to mass public support behind business co-operation in the re-employment movement.

While he still had the bituminous coal code on his hands for completion of final details, he was expected to take it to the White House before the end of the day and turn to other pressing questions including the price control issue presented in the codes for retail trade, sources of considerable controversy.

The buying movement was to be discussed tonight in an address to a national audience by Senator Robert F. Wagner, of New York, chairman of the national labor board.
