good substantial prize.

"Corn is grown in many localities. Competition bids to be keen. Grab your ears, get in the band wagon and find who has the biggest and best ears," he urges.

"Barley and oats are on the upgrade, and suitable prizes will be given for these crops also. Of course," he adds, "you will be interested in whether your barley will stand the 3.2 test or not."

"Union county owing to its situation between the Blue, Willows and Powder mountains has a wide variety of climate, giving it a wide variety of crops."

"The committee on grains, grasses and forage plants solicits the cooperation of all growers in this locality to procure some of the specimens and exhibit them at the fair. They are trying many new kinds of wheat and by bringing in samples and having them tested and placed in competition, they believe that they will be able to eliminate the grades, thereby standardizing the grain by growing fewer varieties and making the crop more uniform as far as locality and condition will permit."

WHEAT INTERESTS WOULD ORGANIZE TO SELL SURPLUS

PORTLAND, Sept. 19 (AP)—Wheat interests of the Pacific northwest have agreed to form a corporation through which 40,000,000 bushels of surplus wheat may be exported.

This information was conveyed to Henry A. Wallace, secretary of agriculture, in a letter airmailed from Portland last night. The letter was drawn at a conference of growers, millers and exporters who met with federal representatives Monday. It was signed by representatives of the Farmers' National Grain corporation, the North Pacific Grain Growers, Inc., the North Pacific Millers' association, and the North Pacific Exporters' association.

The agreement must be approved by Secretary Wallace before it becomes effective.
