## Sleeping Disease Epidemic Now On Wane In St. Louis

**ST. LOUIS, Sept. 21 (47)**—A continued decline in the number of deaths and new cases reported strengthened the belief of scientists today that the "sleeping sickness" epidemic is definitely on the wane in greater St. Louis.

During 24 hours, only three deaths and 22 new cases were reported. This brought the death toll to 159 since the outbreak of the epidemic in mid-July.

Virtually certain that they have established and carried on once, halli-tis in monkeys, research scientists were seeking to determine how the mysterious disease is spread. The general theory among medical experts was that encephalitis is transmitted by means of nose and throat secretions. If monkeys develop sleeping sickness after the secretions have been administered to them, scientists consider they will have established the means of transmission, of vital importance before serum or other means of immunization may be developed.
