Organizations Of Vets Oppose U.S. Economy Act

WASHINGTON (AP)—Unification of five major veterans organizations behind a drive to repeal the national economy act and its cuts in former soldier benefits will be sought at a conference of national commanders here October 10.

O. K. Brobeck, legislative representative of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, announced the call on behalf of James E. Van Zandt, commander-in-chief of the organization.

Van Zandt, in a communication to leaders of the American Legion, disabled veterans of the World War, United Spanish War, Veterans and Grand Army of the Republic, said: "Harmonious agreement on a set of principles to be adopted by this conference will serve as a warning to anti-veteran forces and political autocrats that the veterans of this nation are again marching side by side—as in days of yore—determined for victory in behalf of a cause for which they are willing to fight with every ounce of energy at their command."

A freak storm near Portland late yesterday killed one man and caused considerable damage before it blew itself out. Virgil Davis, 98, of Molalla, was killed by lightning. With H. H. Kinchloe, he was cutting wood on the S. P. Lowe farm. He sought refuge under a tall fir tree. A bolt of lightning struck the tree, ripped down its trunk, killed Davis instantly and seriously hurt Kinchloe.

The gale crashed over Brian Island airport, picked up a small plane and hurled it 100 yards.

to Union Junction and thence over the present line to La Grande.

The rumor was first heard by the Observer during the noon hour and neither Mr. Cochran nor Mr. Eberhard could be reached. So a query was put on the A. P. wire, asking the Associated Press to contact The Portland and Omaha railroad headquarters for a news.

Pretty soon, Mr. Cochran denied selling the railroad. "We'd like to sell it, but we haven't any prospects in sight as yet," he remarked.

Then came the final and crushing blow that sent the rumor into the waste basket:

Omaha headquarters told the A. P.: "Union Pacific headquarters say 'no foundation' for reported Union Pacific purchase of other lines."

And in Portland, General Solicitor Spencer, said: "I can't conceive of such a thing. I believe I would have heard of it if such a thing were incubating."

And so another big story flopped!

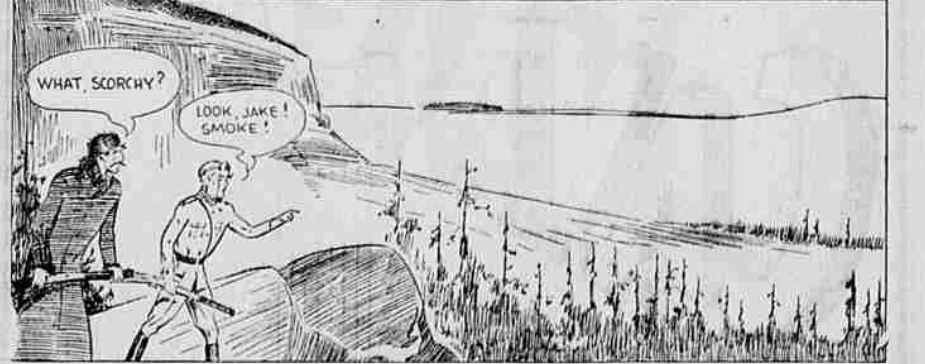

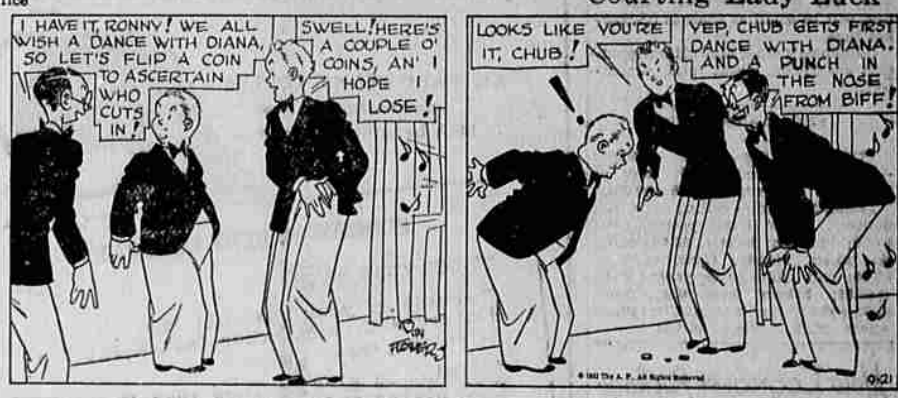

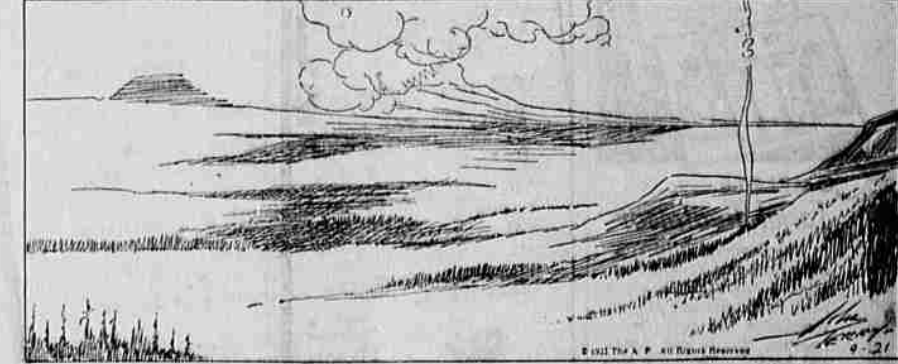
