Overhauling Los Angeles appeared a hopeless assignment for Hollywood today. After dividing a doubleheader with the Angels last night, the Stars still trailed by six games, with only 10 remaining to be played.

Harold Hoyt To See Action In Game Tomorrow

SALEM, Sept. 22 (AP)—An inexperienced but fairly heavy line and a light fast backfield will start for Willamette university against Oregon State college in a practice game at Corvallis tomorrow.

Coach Roy S. "Spec" Keene said both his tackles were inexperienced as were several of the other linemen playing new positions. "I will use everybody on my squad and see what they can do. We will have half dozen on plays and we're going to try every chance to score," Keene said.

Hoyt, of La Grande Normal, and Pettys and Gretsch of Monmouth Normal, are reserves expected to see considerable action. Fred Carlson of Eugene received an injury in scrimmage which will keep him out of the game.

Harold Hoyt, who attended E. O. N. for two years, entered Willamette as a junior this fall. Hoyt was guard on the Mountaineer eleven last year and was named on one of the opponent all-star elevens.

COUGAR ELEVEN IS OUT TO WIN '33 CHAMPIONSHIP

PULLMAN, Wash., Sept. 22 (AP)—Washington State's Cougars are out to win the Pacific coast conference football championship, and nobody, from Coach O. E. (Babe) Hollingsbery down to Bossy, the mascot, is making any bones about it.

With 19 letters on hand, the 1933 squad appears to be the strongest and classiest looking outfit Hollingsbery has had in his seven years at Washington State. The faithful have little doubt but that the Cougars will finish at least in the first division, and many of them are predicting the championship will return to Pullman after an absence of two years.

Sixteen lettersmen from last year's powerful squad reported for the first practice, along with nearly every member of the undefeated 1932 freshman team and three veterans of former seasons.

The line promises to be mighty, with lettermen in every position except the two guards, where regular reserves will be posted. The forward line will be built around Frank Ingram, a six-foot-two, 200-pound tackle, who missed only three minutes of play in Washington State's six major contests last year.

The giant George Theodoratos, who alternated at full last year, will be given a permanent assignment at tackle. Theodoratos reported this fall in perfect trim, weighing more than 240 pounds.

The backfield likewise is powerful and experienced. Stan Colburn, a 200-pound halfback and ball-toting powerhouse is the key man behind the forward wall. Phil Sarboe, a slight but mighty triple threat, will be regular quarter. Henry Bendele is back at full, and Ollie Arbelbide for the other half.

Outstanding among last year's freshmen is Ted Christoffersen, the big blond Norwegian halfback from Honolulu who was a sensation as a rookie. He will understudy Colburn and Arbelbide.

Well grounded in fundamentals and primary plays as a result of a long spring practice, the Cougars were set to work immediately on formations and signal drill this fall.

They are sighting their guns on the game with Southern California at Los Angeles October 7. The Trojans, 1932 champions, handed Washington State its only defeat last year, and are looked upon as the biggest threat in the championship drive this year.

Seven conference games are on the schedule, including one with Oregon State at Corvallis, Oct. 28.
