GOVERNMENT TO BUY SURPLUSES TO HELP NEEDY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—President Roosevelt Thursday ordered the purchase of surplus food stuffs and staples by the government to be turned over for relief work.

The program called for federal purchase of surplus beef, dairy and poultry products, cotton and cotton seed, among other things.

A rough estimate places the amount of purchases at about \$75,000,000.

The government will buy at market price.

Personally announcing this gigantic proposal to furnish the wanting surpluses to needy persons, Mr. Roosevelt emphasized its two-fold object:

First, to improve relief particularly in those areas where he considers present relief to be totally inadequate.

Second, to aid in reducing surpluses and thereby stabilize markets.

The cotton to be bought will be manufactured into cloth.

The undertaking will be directed by the administrators of federal relief and of the agriculture adjustment act.

The funds will come from the department of agriculture and from the federal relief administration.
