Rally Day Will Be Held In Two Churches Sunday

La Grande Houses of Worship Inviting Normal School Students to Join Congregations.

With students established in their schools, fall activities in general well under way and organizations, both church and otherwise beginning their fall schedules, the churches of the city are sending invitations to students from out-of-town to join their congregations during their stay in La Grande.

Several church programs scheduled for Sunday are of unusual interest. Rally day programs are scheduled at the Christian and Presbyterian churches. The Baptist church announces that beginning with the first Sunday in October, the evening service will be unified meeting of the young people and the regular congregation worship with sermon.

Programs for Sunday include: Central Church of Christ (Pennsylvania Avenue) Rally and Promotion day will be observed at the Central Church of Christ Sunday, beginning with the Bible school services at 9:45 a. m. Promotions for the coming year will be made under the direction of Miss Dorothy Smuts, general superintendent. Awards will be given to those who are promoted from one department to the other and a complete change in the junior and intermediate departments will be inaugurated. New class rooms have been assigned to these departments in an effort to eliminate crowding and to make the classes more interesting. New literature for the coming quarter has been secured. This Bible school provides classes for all ages from cradle roll to adult, and a complete corps of teachers has been secured for the coming season. Those who do not attend Bible school elsewhere are invited to enroll in the classes to be formed Sunday.

At 11 a. m. the pastor, Rev. Paul De F. Mortimore, will present a Rally day sermon using as the subject,

"Expectancy and Success." It will be a challenge to go forward during the coming year in the expectation of accomplishing greater things in the church. Communion will be observed and the choir will sing a special anthem. Announcement will be made at this service of a special ten weeks campaign for increasing attendance and an increase in the work of the church.

Christian Endeavor services are conducted at 6:30 by the young people of the church. A division of the group will be made Sunday evening with junior, high school and young people's societies to be formed. This will include special groups for every age of the younger folks of the church. The service begins promptly at 6:30.

The Sunday evening service is held at 7:30. The orchestra will play a concert. A popular song service will be presented on the subject, "Pay Day." The public is invited to attend this service.

M. E. Church, South All regular services will be held, beginning with Sunday school at 9:45 a. m., with W. B. Starnier in charge. The morning worship service is at 11 o'clock and the evening service at 7:30 o'clock. The pastor, Rev. A. J. Starnier, will preach at both services. Epworth League meets at 6:30 and extends a welcome to all young people who do not go elsewhere.

St. Peter's Church (Episcopal) (Fourth and O Avenue) Holy communion at 8 a. m. begins the day's services in this church. Church school meets at 9:45 a. m. and at 11 o'clock morning prayer with sermon is held.

The Young People's fellowship meets at 6:30 p. m. at Roman hall. This will be in the form of a combined social and business meeting, with election of officers to be held.

Baptist Church (Spring and Sixth) At the Baptist church Sunday morning the pastor will speak on "Other Gods." Special music will be furnished by the choir.

For the evening sermon the subject will be "Personal Responsibility." A song service will precede the sermon. The hours of services are: Morn-

ing worship, 11:00; evening preaching service, 7:30; Young People's meeting, 6:30; Bible school, 9:45; Thursday evening prayer meeting, 7:30.

Beginning with the first Sunday in October, the evening service will be a unified service composed of the young people's meeting and preaching message by the pastor. The hour of beginning will be 7:00 and closing not later than 8:30. This arrangement will permit the student body to attend the evening service without consuming undue portion of their time. At that time, the pastor will begin a series of short messages on the reasonableness of the Christian philosophy. The first subject will be "The Place of Sin in the Christian Philosophy."

A cordial invitation is extended to all, especially to visiting students.

Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington) "The church is the result of God's infinite power, the production of his almighty power, and the effect of his unsearchable grace. Some hate it. If possible they would annihilate it. All their powers are directed against it; they label it, they sneer at it, they profess to despise it. Can they hope to succeed? As soon might they quench the orb of day, or drive back the chariot wheels of the queen of night. Why not come to church and let us reason together," asks the minister, Rev. J. George Walls, who will speak Sunday morning, 11:00 o'clock, on "Man Switched Powerhouses," sermon II on "Cause, Effect, Cure." Special music is scheduled with Miss Gladys Miller at the organ console.

Sunday will be devoted to Rally day program in the Sunday school. At the regular hour, 9:45 a. m. Members of the cradle roll, beginners and primary departments will present a demonstration of the work that is being done in the departments. Parents and friends are cordially invited. Christian Endeavorers are inviting all young people not attending services elsewhere at the hour of 6:30, to enjoy the evening program with them at the church.

First Church of Christ, Scientist (First and Washington) Services are held at 9:45 a. m. (Sunday school) and at 11 a. m. (morning service), also on Wednesday evening at 8 p. m.

The reading room in the West-Jacobson building is open from 1 to 4:30 p. m. daily.

The subject of the Sunday service will be "Reality."

The golden text will be, "Behold, I create new heavens and a new earth; and the former shall not be remembered, nor come into mind" (Isa. 65: 17).

Among the citations which comprise the lesson-sermon is the following from the Bible: "I know that, whatever God doeth, it shall be for ever: nothing can be put to it, nor any thing taken from it" (Eccl. 3: 14).

The lesson-sermon also includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook.

"Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "To grasp the reality and order of being in its Science, you must begin by reckoning God as the divine Principle of all that really is. . . . There is but one primal cause. Therefore there can be no effect from any other cause, and there can be no reality in aught which does not proceed from this great and only cause" (pp. 275, 207).

Salvation Army (211 Fir Street) Beginning Saturday and extending through Monday the Salvation Army is observing its annual harvest festival week. During this period a special appeal is made for funds for home work, especially children's homes and hospitals.

Saturday evening's service will be a sacred concert. Paul Knauts will furnish vocal solos and a quartet will sing several numbers. Miss Lillian Knauts will play the piano. A special speaker is provided for the evening also. All are invited.

Sunday school is at 2:30 p. m. and the Sunday salvation meeting at 8 p. m.

Monday at 8 p. m. there will be an auction of fruits and vegetables, canned goods, etc., proceeds all to go to the above mentioned funds.

Wednesday evening at 8 p. m., a special service will be conducted by Brigadier James Dee from Portland. This will be his first official visit to La Grande and a large attendance is expected.

Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you as though some strange thing happened unto you. I Peter 4:12.

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Rogers 'Plays' An Accordion But Protests, Anyhow

HOLLYWOOD—Will Rogers will be heard playing an accordion in his new picture, "Mr. Skitch," but he won't actually be playing it.

And therein lay the bone of contention in an argument that kept a film company waiting some 15 or 20 minutes while Will and his director, James Cruze, thrashed it out.

Will's point was that everybody knows Will Rogers can't play an accordion, and he doesn't want to fool anybody into believing he can.

Cruze argued and pleaded, but Will said nay. So out to the back lot on the "New England Street" which was temporarily doubling for a Missouri town, came a story department executive to bolster the cause of Cruze. Will "played" the accordion.

He doesn't like fakes. "I don't like to pull fakes in my pictures," Rogers commented later. "I don't believe in foolin' people. But they say this accordion comes into the story later and they got to have it. Now if it'd only been a violin—I can fiddle a little. Well, enough to get by."

In this picture with Will, incidentally, is Rochelle Hudson, diminutive girl who came to Hollywood from the home town, Claremore, Okla. Will's home town, and is only now hitting her stride after several poor starts. Previous contracts at Fox and R-K-O brought only minor roles or none at all, but when she was called for the latest Rogers film she won a new Fox contract. After this one she will support Warner Baxter in "Odd Thurdays."

No, she didn't know Will back in the old home town.

"Minnie" An Old Girl That popular figure of cacophonous melody, "Minnie the Moocher," is really quite an old timer. Harold Arlen and Ted Koehler, who presented her for up-to-date orchestras, merely revived and modernized, they say, a character chanted about in New York's Chinatown the past 25 years. The song-writing pair are here to compose for "Let's Fall in Love," a musical saga of the movie extra.

Harry Cohn, Columbia executive, returned from Europe without signing any foreign stars, although there are a few, he admitted, the studio would like to get.

"You talk to them about Hollywood," he says, "and their eyes get big."

"Then they send their agents to talk to you—and the figures get big."

commerce sent a request to all chambers throughout the United States to fight for certain economies, to shorten the working day for school, to shorten the year, to lower the pay, to shorten the number of years required and to charge the parents for a part of education above the eighth grade.

During the last session of the legislature, Mr. Carleton said, the demands of the national chamber were reflected in the legislature. The people opposing the schools are organized and were fighting. Bill after bill detrimental to the schools was introduced last session, but the O. S. T. A. through the local schools, reached the people, and they in turn through petition, letter and other means changed the sentiment of the legislature and many bills were defeated.

Representative Walter M. Pierce, of Union county, spoke on "National Recovery." He traced the change from the old Asian doctrine, "Let the buyer beware," to the new tenet, "Let the seller beware," which is becoming more and more a national condition. The speaker discussed the bank holiday and other legislation during the Roosevelt regime, the whole trend of which is to equalize the burden on the ordinary man.

The crowning achievement of the administration is the national recovery act to put men to work and divide the profits of industry, he said.

E. A. Sayre, superintendent of public instruction, introduced the speakers.

Mrs. Myrtle Russell, accompanied by Mrs. Merlin Batley, sang "Mell-sande in the Woods" and "Since You Went Away." The meeting was opened with community singing led by Harvey Carter, accompanied by Mrs. Vina Conley. Rev. J. George Walls, of the Presbyterian church, pronounced the invocation.

During the business session, H. W. Adams, superintendent of schools at Corvallis, was nominated by the Union county division as vice president.

factured product, 8 and 6; chemicals and explosives, 406 and 282; flour and mill products, 5275 and 2089, increase of 29 per cent; iron and steel, 322 and 138; petroleum and its products, 9719 and 9066, increase of 7.2 per cent; sugar and sugar beets, 1375 and 1362.

Miscellaneous carloadings call for 6203 cars for the next quarter, compared with 6142 for the period last year, an increase of 10 per cent. Less than car load space is estimated at 33,679 cars compared with 29,921, an increase of about 13 per cent.

Commercial and trade organizations reported that the revival in the lumber business shared with the NRA program in accounting for the great increase in employment in the northwest.
