

La Grande Defeats Cove, 43 to 0

TIGERS ROLL UP ONE-SIDED SCORE IN OPENING TILT

La Grande High's football team, making its 1933 debut, scored seven touchdowns against a hard-fighting Cove team here Saturday, winning by a score of 43 to 0.

Although the Tigers outweighed their opponents somewhat, at times the visitors dominated the play, although they were unable to continue any offensive thrust long enough to score. Twice Cove was within scoring distance, but each time La Grande took the ball on downs.

The game was only a few minutes old when the first Tiger score was chalked up. The Blue and White took the ball on its own 30-yard stripe after a punt and E. DeBole plunged 16 yards on the first play. Cove was offside and the ball went down on Cove's 40. Floberg skirted tackle to Cove's 34 and L. DeBole stepped around end for 34 yards and a touchdown.

In the second quarter R. DeBole opened the way for another score when he advanced the ball to his own 47-yard line after a 26-yard run. Then Bud Reynolds faked back and tossed a neat pass to Hughey Ivers, who took it on the 30-yard line and galloped across for a second score.

Before the half ended, R. DeBole kicked out of bounds on Cove's six-yard line. Webb blocked a Cove punt but on the next play, R. DeBole was thrown back to the 18-yard line when the Tiger line allowed Cove forwards to slip through. Then Able plowed the Cove line to the six-yard stripe and Floberg went over on the next play. The half ended 18 to 0.

Starting from midfield, the Tigers fourth score came on a steady march. Able went four, a pass failed, R. DeBole reeled off 10 yards to Cove's 35, Able passed to Bud Reynolds who was stopped on the 12-yard line. Floberg hit the line for six yards, and Able took the oval over in four straight amashes.

Shortly before the third period ended, Reynolds intercepted a Cove pass on the 33-yard line and dodged through almost the entire Cove team for a touchdown. Alvey kicked goal, the only point made after touchdown during the game.

Reynolds intercepted another Cove pass on the opponent's 45-yard line and returned it four yards as the last period started. V. Bean plunged seven yards, and Hanson reeled off seven more in a first down. A long pass failed, and Reynolds went around end for five. Bean made nine yards to Cove's 15 in two tries, R. DeBole stepped off 11 more and Bean went the remaining four for another score.

Cove drove into La Grande's 37-yard line before R. Webb intercepted a pass on the Tiger's 35-yard line, and ran 11 yards. Hanson advanced four yards.

A little later R. Webb intercepted a Cove pass on his 35-yard line and ran 11 yards before being downed. Hanson gained four but La Grande was offside and the ball went back to Cove's 12-yard line. Hanson lost a yard on the next play but Webb made it first down on the one-yard line with an 11-yard gain. Johnson went over on the next play.

Cove's best chance to score came late in the second quarter when R. DeBole intercepted a pass and ran 60 yards to La Grande's nine-yard stripe. Hyde tackling him and preventing a touchdown, Cove scored four yards on a reverse and made a yard each on two more plays before the gun ended the half.

Both teams resorted to the air frequently but with only a few exceptions. On indications Saturday, the Tigers this year are specializing on offense, and they were after touchdowns at all times. The line showed promise considering the earliness of the season and the backfield looked fairly good, although a bit slow at times. The old huddle has been forsaken, with Reynolds and other quarterbacks calling signals, speeding up the play a great deal. R. Ivers turned in a pretty good account of himself at end and so did the DeBole brothers, Floberg and Reynolds in the backfield.

A fair-sized crowd witnessed the game.

WOLVERINES HAVE OTHERS WORRIED IN THE BIG TEN

CHICAGO (AP) — Just how vital Harry Newman, all-American game clincher, was to Michigan's football conquest last year may be answered in this year's Big Ten free-for-all. Almost man for man the same Michigan team which, aided by innumerable Newman field goals, punt returns to touchdowns, forward passes to touchdowns, points after touchdowns, and what not, won the undisputed 1932 title, will take the field again this fall.

Except for the unique importance of Newman's part in Wolverine success, the roster of returning Michigan letter-winners would make the Maize and Blue almost an odds-on favorite for the 1933 conference championship.

Even as it is, "Who's gonna stop Michigan?" is a question no Big Ten expert dares try to answer.

Regular For Every Position

In his bid for the fourth successive league title Michigan has shared or won, Coach Harry Kipke will have more than enough regulars from the 1932 team to fill all positions. The Wolverines shared the 1931 crown with Purdue and Northwestern and the 1930 title with the Purple. These same eleven once again appear Michigan's most dangerous rivals.

Such skilled backs as Fay, Regeard, Ryerhus, Heston, Oliver, Tessmer, Renner and Westover may, Kipke reasons, be able to combine their talents to execute some of the manifold chores Newman personally took care of last year.

As for the Maize and Blue line, the lone vacancy, that of Ivan Williamson at end, will be filled by no less an athlete than Willis Ward, negro track star who made his mark last year. At the other end will be Ted Peckoway, a first-rate flankman.

There are three centers — all-conference Chuck Bernard, Ford and Pusey — a pair of guards, Kowalik and Savage, and three tackles, Wistert, Austin and Hildebrand, all regulars in 1932.

Those Hollermeier Backs

Purdue will need to fill some gaping holes in the line, notably those left by Center Oehler, End Moss and Guard Letzinger, if the Hollermeiers' backfield ace hope to continue the ground-slamming spree they have enjoyed. Tackles Pebrine and Uigens, Guard Peters and End Lowery represent a good start on this task.

In the backfield, smashing Roy Hoestmann, fullback, will be missing, but Hecker, Purvis, Carter, Pankster, Ribbet, Peele and Krogan will round out a backfield that can step with the best.

Northwestern lost Pug Rentner's individual brilliance but 16 lettermen return, including Backs Olson and Sullivan, Tackle Riley, Guard Kawai and several cage ends. Those, with a fine crop of sophomores, make Purple prospects rosy. Dick Hanley's line will be young, but bigger and faster than his 1932 forward array.

Minnesota and Ohio State apparently belong again in the dark horse class. Both have many vets returning, and Minnesota is rich in sophomores.

Illini Has 19 Lettermen

Illinois figures to continue the drive begun at mid-season in 1932 to bounce out of the second division. Coach Bob Zupoke counts heavily on improved morale shown by his youngsters, of whom there are 19 lettermen.

Doo Clarence Spawr has little hope of duplicating his 1932 third-place performance with a Wisconsin team to be matched around only eight lettermen. Chicago looks for an all-around revival under its new coach, Clark Shaughnessy, and with a crop of sophomores far above anything

the midway has known for a decade, Indiana and Iowa both expect to be much stronger, but competition for all the higher rungs on the Big Ten ladder is so intense they'll have to exceed past performances by a great deal to get out of the second division.

COAST TEAMS TO SETTLE DOWN TO CONFERENCE PLAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 25 (AP) — Opening skirmishes leading toward the Pacific coast conference championship will take place on far western gridirons next Saturday.

In the most important of the pigskin scrambles, Stanford's Indians will square off against the University of California at Los Angeles Bruins. For several seasons, Stanford has been the football dumps but the 1933 squad makes its first bid for conference recognition with high hopes instilled by a new coach, Claude "Tiny" Thornhill, successor to Glen Warner.

Under Thornhill's leadership, the Indians started the fall campaign last weekend with a 27-0 win over San Jose State despite continued Indian fumbling, followers were impressed with the dash and zip displayed. The visiting Bruins will have the advantage in the matter of experienced players and probably will take the field as the favored eleven.

U. C. L. A. chalked up an easy double victory Saturday, defeating San Diego State 13-0 and Los Angeles J. C. reserves, 34-0.

O. S. C. Plays Montana
Other conference clashes will pair off Montana against Oregon State and Idaho against Washington. With the two coast teams in the roles of favorites, Washington beat Gonzaga 13-0 Saturday while Oregon State won two games by scores of 21-0, from Southern Oregon Normal and Willamette, respectively. Neither Montana nor Idaho have seen action yet.

Southern California's championship defending Trojans will take on Tom Lieh's strong Loyola of Los Angeles squad in a non-conference tilt. Followers hope the game's outcome will be more impressively in favor of their team than was the case a year ago. At that time Coach Howard Jones' eleven eked out a 6-0 win over the Loyolans.

As for seasonal starter, Southern California's wallowed Occidental, 39-0 and Whittier, 51-0, Saturday, while the night before, Loyola rushed through to a 12-0 win over California Tech.

Bears Beaten 7 to 0
California's Bears, victims of the season's first major upset when they lost to Santa Clara, 7-0, Saturday, will continue in the non-conference game class next weekend. The Bears will play a double header against California Aggies and the University of Nevada.

Washington State and Oregon list non-conference gridiron sessions, the former meeting College of Puget Sound and Oregon playing Gonzaga. Washington State ran up a 48-0 score on Whitman last Saturday.

Young Roosevelt Is Grid Candidate
