REPORT 5000 KILLED, HURT IN TAMPICO

Through the rest of Mexico heavy losses were reported because of continuing rains.

Tampico was placed under martial law. Its harbor was closed to shipping. Airplanes could not get through to its flooded airport, it was believed days might elapse before relief could reach the city.

In the entire Tampico district, as far west as 175 miles, the storm spread death and destruction. The city of Cardenas, in San Luis Potosi, reported that at least 30 drowned as the result of the collapse of a railroad dam.

State department records list 969 American citizens living in the Tampico district.

F. R. SENDS WIRE WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (AP)—President Roosevelt's concern over the disastrous hurricane at Tampico was expressed in a telegram sent today to President Rodriguez of Mexico.
