

NORMAL SCHOOL TO OPEN SEASON HERE ON SEPT. 30

The Eastern Oregon Normal school Mountaineers, with barely two weeks of practice behind them, will tackle their first football foe of the season here Saturday afternoon in Whitworth college of Spokane, coached by Henry Gustafson.

The game will be of unusual interest for four reasons. First to see up the 1933 edition of the E. O. N. grid team; second, because it will be the first game ever played here on the new Normal school football field on Eighth street; third, it will be the first appearance of Whitworth in La Grande; fourth, it will mark the debut of the new yellow and gold Mountaineer jerseys and grid helmets.

Coach Bob Quinn put three teams of players through an initial scrimmage last evening, and the rest of this week workouts will continue from 3:15 to 6 p. m. daily. All of the first week was spent on fundamentals, but team play is in vogue now, and although Quinn doesn't expect to use many plays Saturday, he expects those to be done just right. Early practice figure Quinn's team will be stronger than last season, particularly in the line. Also, a new halfback by name of Fred Peterson, all-star for Queen Anne's High of Seattle and later with Bob Matthews West Seattle Athletic club, has joined the squad. He is expected to bolster up the ball carrying department considerably.

New linemen on the squad include John and Henry Haglund, of Pendleton, and tackle respectively, and Gust, of Pendleton, a tackle. A few of the boys who turned out the first of last week have dropped out, but 25 men remain on the squad and Quinn does not intend to cut this until after the Whitworth game.

The E. O. N. manager expects to substitute freely during the game, and by Saturday night should have a good idea as to what his players will actually do under fire.

Two bleacher sections have been installed at the E. O. N. field, capable of seating about 250, and in addition, cars may be driven onto the edge of the upper part of the field so that a large crowd can be handled nicely at the Mountaineer stadium.

Oregon Tackles Tough Gonzaga Team Saturday

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Sept. 26 (Special).—With some too good memories of the score given them by Gonzaga last year when the Webfoots barely won out, 21 to 7, the University of Oregon football squad started intensive practice this week for the tilt with the Bulldogs at Spokane, Saturday, September 30. Last year Oregon was forced to send in several of its crippled stars in order to stem a desperate last quarter scoring threat by Mike Pecorovich's eleven. Adding to the worries of the Webfoot coaching staff is the hard-fighting battle Gonzaga gave Oregon State last year in a similar early season contact.

The Webfoots are in fine shape for the coming game and will present a veteran lineup at Spokane. With 22 lettersmen on hand, Coach Frank Callahan will have a small but experienced squad this season. Barring injuries which would leave them destitute of material, Oregon is expected to put a well balanced team of veterans in the field.

State Treasurer To Pay \$1,437,500 Bonds Due Oct. 1

SALEM, Sept. 26 (AP).—The state treasurer today was preparing to pay off \$1,437,500 of outstanding bonds due October 1 against the World war veterans state aid commission and the state highway commission. Interest on the sums totaled about as much as the principal, the amount to be paid approximately \$1,925,000. Of the outstanding bonds, \$500,000 were those of the bonus commission and \$927,500 of the state highway commission.

Prune Output For Oregon Decreasing

PORTLAND, Sept. 26 (AP).—The Journal and today that a survey of the prune crop prospects in Oregon now indicates a reduction in the yield estimate to 35,000 tons from 38,000 tons "and even lower figures will be submitted unless there is a stoppage of damage."

"With the rains rather steady," the report said, "beans are expected that total production will be greatly curtailed."
