

Quinn Driving Squad As Opening Game Nears

THREE HOURS OF PRACTICE DAILY ALL THIS WEEK

Football work at the Eastern Oregon Normal school is entering its final stage now in preparation for the opening game of the season here Saturday at 2:30 p. m. against Whitworth college of Spokane. Snowy Gustafson and his squad are scheduled to arrive here Friday night. It was learned today.

"Football work" is exactly the right term to use. Coach Bob Quinn, with this in mind, is putting the boys through nearly three hours of running plays, scrimmage, etc., each afternoon on the new gridiron, and they're learning a lot of football and at the same time toughening up rapidly.

Right now, all indications point to a team quite a bit larger than represented by the E. O. N. last fall. Additional material plus several seasoned veterans is giving the Mountaineers a much brighter outlook on life at present.

During scrimmage yesterday afternoon, a number of townspeople on the sidelines were interested spectators. They saw a backfield in operation that might be selected by Quinn to start next Saturday, although Quinn may have entirely different plans.

Tuck Hodgson, of Adams, line man of last year, has been drafted as a fullback, and he's learning rapidly. Plenty of weight, zip and work is helping Tuck to fit into the position in nice shape and he's going to worry some secondary defense men before the season has advanced very far. Tuck has lots of drive and as he learns more about his job, he may be hitting 'em like Bud Beard did a few years ago.

Crawford Shows Promise
Crawford, at one half, looks like a valuable addition to the squad. Local fans remember him from his high school days in Baker when he played football and basketball for George Scott along with Harold Foslin, now at O. S. C. Crawford also played for Corvallis high. He has the appearance of a dangerous open field runner, and is likely to sift through the slightest opening on high. He's not so tall, but has plenty of weight and knows how to use it. His blocking had some of the boys in the defensive line wondering what hit them yesterday.

Jiggs Burnett, quarterback last year, shows general improvement this fall, and should develop as the season continues.

Fred Peterson, of Seattle, who fits in at the other halfback position, is a triple threat man and as he adapts himself to Quinn's style of football, ought to make the headlines every now and then. Peterson is of the elusive type of ball carrier, shifty and fast, and in addition kicks and passes fairly well. Others likely to be called on for punting are Hanks, Smith and Ragdale.

Quinn also will have another backfield that won't be far behind the four mentioned above—a matter of fact, he has more reserves of good caliber this year than ever before.

BUCKS TO HAVE BETTER ELEVEN THAN LAST YEAR

(From the Walla Walla Bulletin)
Pendleton's Buckaroos will show to greater advantage in football this season than was the case in 1932 when Clarence Hines took up the coaching reins at the neighboring Oregon school. The Bucks will not be a tremendously powerful squad, nor will they be particularly outstanding, but they will play football and so will make most of their opponents squame right along to do anything.

As the Bulletin's observer watched the Buckaroos at drill, that opinion was formed on the 1933 prospects. Coach Hines concurred in it as he recounted the losses from the 1932 squad, the lessons the returning veterans had received and the probable strength of this year's aggregation, which opens regular play against Kennewick this Saturday.

Graduation losses took a fall out of the grid squad's strength when some of the ranking linemen moved on. That list included Stover and Alberto, a husky pair of tackle; Bender and Lybeck, ends; Minick, Moore and Nash, guards, and Warren, center; Hoehns and Tuter, the latter a capable quarterback, went out of the backfield.

In addition to those graduation losses, Hines lost Ollchist, his outstanding backfield candidate, when the lad moved to Portland and enrolled in high school there. Ollchist is being missed, particularly since the backfield lineup now is lacking in reserves, whereas the previous setup of Hines shows a fair on-both-balance and a few pliable reserves.

Bill Craswell, a most defensive player and now showing signs of developing into a possible offensive performer, is being used at fullback. Donald Sams is his understudy and also the substitute quarterback, where Harold Rice, a sub in 1932, is taking Tuter's place. Gerald Graybeal, a leftman, is holding down one halfback position, while Harold Hoesperger, a sub end a year ago, is playing at the other half.

Ends show one veteran in Harold Eason, with Jack Goodwin, Kent England and Ray Boomer as the others. Tackles include Francis Schmitt, a sub center in 1932; Roscoe Gemmill, veteran of last year's campaign, and Clayton Pearson and Phil Lassner.

One veteran also is back for guard duty. He is John Dornbrack, with Ray Fugit, Franklin Chastay and Regene Worthington as the others. Centers include Ralph Bond, who at 183 pounds is the squad's giant, and Jimmy McClure, last season a second string backfield lad.

Out of a dozen, or so more eager candidates for reserve places, Hines hopes to build up something in the way of backfield substitutes, plus a few linemen to guard against the usual mishaps of the season. With a game every Saturday from this week on through and including November 25, the squad will need all the reserve strength that can be developed.

While the battle for positions has been keen, eight of nine lettermen seem assured of their old berths in the starting lineup. The team as a whole is lighter than the 1932 crew but will probably average slightly more than 180 pounds.

Promising backfield candidates are scarce, and several of them are relying on speed and cleverness to offset lack of weight.

LOS ANGELES IS PENNANT WINNER IN COAST LEAGUE

Portland errors and the Angels' own Dick Ward have assured Los Angeles of its first Coast league pennant since 1928. The Angels won the second half of the 1933 split season but were beaten in the play-off by Hollywood.

Ward's 8-hit pitching helped Los Angeles to trim San Francisco 9-6 yesterday for the single victory needed to eliminate Hollywood as a championship contender. Portland eliminated itself by booting away its series opener with Seattle, 5-3.

Needing victories in all nine of their games this week for a chance to the Los Angeles, the Beavers made five errors to give the last place Indians the game. Tony Freitas was hit hard by the Indians but was well ahead until the Portlanders started fumbling the ball in the final innings.

Meanwhile Frank Shellenback hurled Hollywood to a 10-0 win over the Missions.

Oakland had to go ten innings to win from Sacramento, 10-9.

TIGERS TO PLAY BLUE DEVILS AT WA-HI ON FRIDAY

The La Grande Tigers will face their first tough opponent of the fall football season Friday afternoon when they tangle with the Wa-Hi Blue Devils at Walla Walla, and from reports emanating from the Washington city, La Grande is decidedly the underdog.

One of the biggest reasons why the Tigers will find the Wa-Hi outfit unusually tough is Laman, an end of 1932, but now in fullback position. Laman tips the scales at 195 pounds and scored all 14 points against Pasco last week by sheer power. He hit the line like a ton of bricks propelled at miles per hour speed, and with the Tiger line none too steady — it looks like Laman will pile up some yardage.

The second reason for the Tigers' worry about the forthcoming tilt is that the Wa-Hi line, although not of a veteran nature, will average about 170 pounds—a big line for a high school team.

Wa-Hi has two 235-pound men in the line, McLeod at center and Gehlman, sub guard, Huntington, tackle, and Guenther, back, are the other two veterans remaining from last year along with Laman, but several of the new men had experience on the squad.

Defensively, Walla Walla will be good beyond any doubt, and the Blue Devil offense, while not perfected, undoubtedly will be dangerous.

Coach Ira Woodie is specializing somewhat on offense this fall, and the Tiger team will be out for touchdowns on every offensive play, so that in spite of the larger size of the Wa-Hi team, indications point to a fairly close score.
