ROAD TO ALASKA TO OPEN UP NEW LAND OF BEAUTY

WASHINGTON (AP) — Proponents of the Pacific-Yukon highway, the proposed 2,000 mile road linking Alaska and the United States, are pressing for governmental approval of the project that would make more accessible one of America's "last frontiers."

Anthony J. Diamond, delegate to congress from Alaska, has asked the public works administration for an allotment of \$2,000,000 to finance the Alaskan section of the highway. Diamond also is seeking President Roosevelt's approval of the project, which has been recommended as feasible by the United States commissioners appointed to co-operate with Canadian representatives in studying the plan.

Advocates of the highway say it would open to motorists a new scenic wonderland, to farm settlers rich acres in areas hitherto inaccessible and to miners an opportunity to develop one of the richest mineral storehouses on the North American continent.

The American members of the commission report that the advantages to be derived from a highway extending from Seattle to Fairbanks "are obviously more than commensurate with the cost."

They also say it would foster air commerce with Alaska by furnishing a guiding landmark and by providing service to aviators along the most practicable flying route to the interior of the territory and to Asia.

Thousands of motorists in quest of the new and picturesque in touring territory would travel the Alaskan road every year, it is believed.

Surveys place the highway to the east of the coast mountain range, where climatic conditions are such that snowfall is comparatively light, and if traffic justified the highway could be kept open the year round.

The estimated cost of constructing the Canadian section of the highway is \$11,900,000 while that of the Alaskan section is figured at only \$1,970,000.

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Editor of Plain Dealer Passes On

CLEVELAND, Sept. 27 (AP) — Elbert Hall Baker, who, in his own words, liked "to see a paper striving to improve the community in which it is located," died Tuesday night at the age of 79, after 35 years of planning and building up the Cleveland Plain Dealer and the city itself.

He was chairman of the board of the Plain Dealer Publishing company, and as a leader in the newspaper field throughout the country had served as a director of the Associated Press since 1916, as director of the American Newspaper Publishers association from 1907 to 1924, and as president of the association from 1912 to 1914.

He established the policy of printing "news only" and both sides of controversial questions.
