ESCAPED CONVICTS STILL AT LARGE

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., Sept. 27 (AP)—Ten convicts fleeing temporarily from Indiana prison twice studied elaborate police traps today.

The desperadoes were believed to have separated into three groups after their escape yesterday. Four of the men still held captive Sheriff Charles Reed, of Corydon, Ind. Two other victims, whose automobiles the police commandeered, had been released.

Physicians said Finley P. Carson, a prison clerk shot in the hip and abdomen during the escape, might die. Plans were underway for an inquiry as to how the convicts obtained arms and marched diagonally across the whole prison grounds and out the front door without meeting opposition from guards, who line the high wall of the prison.

HEAR REPORT ON BOY SCOUT WORK DURING THE YEAR

The Boy Scout central committee, composed of two representatives from each troop in La Grande, met at the Sacajawea Inn Tuesday night for the purpose of hearing reports and the election of an advisory board for the coming year.

Members of the advisory board are Norman Price, H. E. Brown, David B. Stoddard, Elmo Stevenson, Harvey Carter and Nephil Combs. A. W. Nelson is the retiring chairman of the board, completing 18 years of service in Boy Scout work.

A committee, composed of Mr. Brown, Mr. Nelson and Dr. Ray Murphy, was appointed to make a study of the boys' work program for the city.

Mr. Price reported for the court of honor committee that about 150 badges have been awarded at six courts and recommended that more attention be paid by each group to having several representatives at each court.

Harvey Carter, head of leadership training and director of activities, reported a training school for scout leaders has been carried on during the last year and recommended that a similar course be offered this year that a consistent trained leadership be available at all times.

Seven registered troops are active in La Grande. Nephil Combs, chairman of troop committees and recruiting, reported. An eighth will be organized this year. The troop committees all are organized. He added.

Mr. Nelson reported for Charles Reynolds, citywide activities and finance, that three citywide activities have been offered the past year, a stunt night in February, a window decoration contest in March and an outdoor court of honor in July. Mr. Nelson reported also on camp activities. Plans for holding two summer camps as they did last summer was accepted as a permanent policy, more boys having attended last summer than ever before in the history of scouting.

The advisory board last night represented at least one delegate from the Episcopal, Christian, Presbyterian, Methodist and First and Second Ward U. D. S. churches and the Rivers school.
