Sermon on Mount, Matt. Chapters 5, 6, 7. Let us live for a few moments in the message wherewith our Lord brings to conclusion that statement of golden principles for the highest human life, which is known as "The Sermon on the Mount." You are familiar with the several principles opened to view in that matchless utterance. We shall not here attempt to review those principles. It will suffice if only we recall how every reading in which we have actively entered into the spirit of them has lifted our spirits free of shackles which had bound us to earthly levels and shut us within cramped and narrowed vision; if we recall how there rose with Him into a mount of vision opened into that life of far horizons, to which the soul come near to Him responds; and if we feel again that exalted yearning for life as it is meant to be in Him, which brought to us a sense of soul-found freedom in a peace which passeth understanding.
