ject to transfer, either ahead or back. They are divided as follows: Central 114, Greenwood 101, Riveria 68, Willow 8. Mid-year students never have been accepted at Ackerman. 100. Mid-year students are handicapped. It is said, under the old plan, and in addition the efficiency of the teaching staff is very materially reduced. Teachers cannot handle two different classes of pupils as efficiently as one single group regardless of numbers of pupils, and the old plan made the teachers render a double service, but the pupils received only a half service. It is explained. Changing of teachers at mid-year, additional study burdens for pupils, readjustment for both teachers and students are some of the other disadvantages of the old system. Supt. The Garden

HOLLYHOCKS FROM SEEDS
Those large double Hollyhocks are now available in colors of bright pink, glowing scarlet, appleblossom, maroon and white. Sow the seeds of these during fall and winter months where the plants are to remain or in flats for transplanting. In Southern California and similar climates they will bloom the following summer.
A new Hollyhock is Imperator, a large fringed flower in colors of pink and salmon shades. Each flower has a double rosette in the center. Hollyhocks may be put to good use as a back ground planting for lower growing plants to cover an unsightly fence or relieve a bare wall. An occasional spraying with Bordeaux Mixture will control and prevent rust or other fungus attacks.
Hollyhocks respond readily to fertilizer and good strong plants which are well fed and grown continuously without interruption will produce decorative foliage and beautiful large flowers. Mix bonemeal and sheep fertilizer or barnyard fertilizer in the soil when it is prepared for planting. At blooming time an application of any good chemical fertilizer will be beneficial.

Want To Be Chic? Add A Suit To Your Wardrobe

Rich velvets with colorful satin blouses, heavy broadcloths trimmed with fur and trim little hairy wools cut on the most tailored lines add variety to the picture.

Blouses with high necklines are universally chosen. Colors darker than the suit are favored for sports and street costumes, while hues lighter than the suit are preferred for formal afternoon models.

Velvet For Formal Wear Velvet suits for formal afternoon wear are a distinctly 1934 note launched by winter fashion shows.

They belong to the "after four o'clock" hours and play no part in workaday wardrobes. Most of them are designed with hiplength jackets and skirts which are almost ankle length and are worn with satin or lame blouses.

One black velvet model, finished with a smart high sable collar, is worn with a white satin blouse having a neckline like a Chinese coat finished in green, red and blue embroidery. Afternoon suits of black crinoline-backed taffeta giving the effect of having been quilted, worn with loose hiplength capes of the same fabric are the "dernier cri" in six o'clock smartness.

Broadcloth Good All Times Broadcloth or duvetyn suits in tones of black, dark green, navy brown or burgundy are the favorite for all-around service, since they may be worn for any town function from breakfast to tea. Many of them are collared in fur and worn with fur waistcoats and hats.

Jackets of many of these models show a tendency to fit slightly at the waistline, many of them even being designed with flaring hipbone basques which give a "nipped in" effect at the waist. One of the smartest models is of dark green broadcloth worn with a high necked dark green crepe blouse and a muff and toque of brown Indian lamb.

Plain wool or tweed suits with high necked blouses of wool or corduroy velvet in a contrasting color are the favorite for sports or all around street wear.

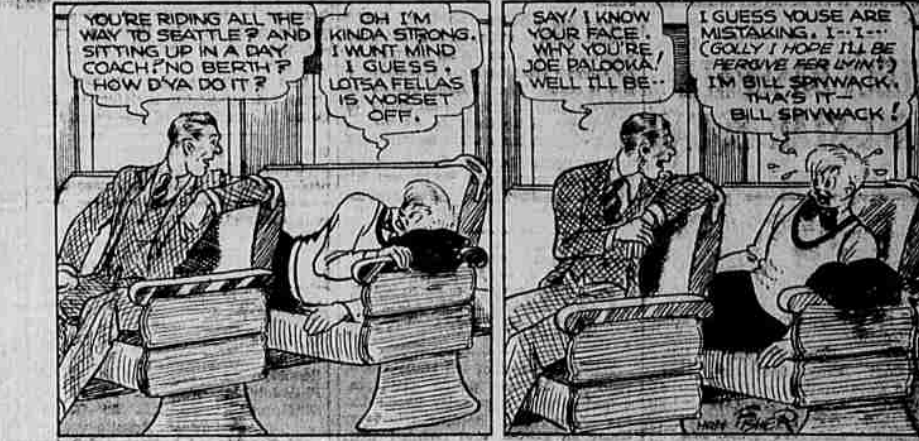

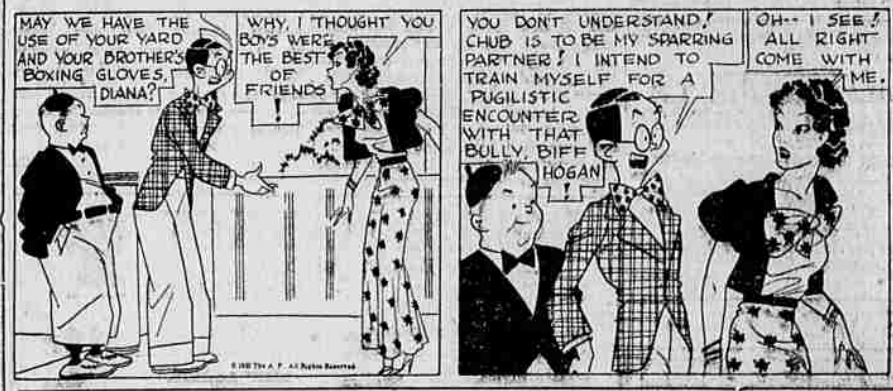
