OWNING CAR NO HANDICAP, ILLINOIS STUDENTS PROVE

URBANA, Ill. (AP)—Having an automobile at one's disposal on the college campus has no deleterious effect on grades, according to statistics compiled by C. R. Frederick, assistant dean of men at the University of Illinois.

Frederick reports that he found 46.18 per cent of the men students who had cars rated above the all-university men's average, while 65 per cent of the women students with cars were above the all-university women's average of grades.

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
