"If we continue along the road we have traveled since March, I have no fear but that we shall regain for the disabled all of the benefits that rightfully should be given them."

Johnson assured the legionnaires that the American people would not permit an injustice to disabled veterans "so long as the veterans demonstrate that they are not seeking benefits for those who have no just call upon the government for support."

Russell French Will Be Buried At Enterprise

ONTARIO, Oct. 4 — Russell M. French, 38, nephew of B. F. Irvine, of Portland, and cousin of United States Senator Charles L. McNary, was instantly killed some time Saturday afternoon on the ranch home of his father-in-law, E. T. Evans, just west of Ontario, when he grasped an 11,000-volt power line while engaged in topping a tree.

The body was found about 2:30 a. m. Sunday in an irrigation ditch into which he fell. Funeral services will be held here today and interment will be at Enterprise, Ore.

Mr. French is survived by his widow, Effie French, and one daughter and his father, John A. French, of Medical Lake, Wash., and two brothers, Irvine French of Enterprise and Dwight French of Klamath Falls.

At the inquest Monday afternoon it was revealed that French apparently had just started to cut some limbs from the treetop when he must have slipped and grasped the wire. Burned spots on the tree showed where the current passed through his body.

C. C. C. CAMPS BREAKING UP FOR WINTER

Five camps of the civilian conservation corps in the Baker district will be abandoned as winter camps by October 10, regular army officers at district headquarters announced.

The camps are: Martin's bridge, Pariah Cabin, Murderer's creek, Bull Prairie and Rock creek (Rager Ranger station).

Those C. C. C. men from the east who do not desire re-enrollment will be moved by special train from Baker the night of October 9 or early the morning of October 10 to Camp Dix, New Jersey to join those who left last week for a reconditioning camp at that place. There will be about eight or 10 leave from each camp.

The remainder will be transferred to companies remaining in the ninth corps area, of which there are five now belonging to the Baker district. Those companies in the Baker district are: Bates, Imnaha, Makury, Frog Heaven and Crane Flats. The destination of these camps is not known, further than that they will be abandoned as winter camps in their present sites.

Orders directing the movement of the companies assigned to these ninth corps area camps are expected here soon. It is believed by officers at the district headquarters that all camp sites will be cleared by the last of October.

When the fund is completed and the pictures obtained, Mr. McElroy will leave for Southern California where he will exhibit the films before clubs, schools, colleges and other organizations.

For the small amount of funds involved as against the tremendous amount of publicity for this particular section to be gained through the showing of the pictures before thousands of Californians, it is believed the plan has no parallel in any previous attempt to advertise this section of the state as a vacation land.

Mr. McElroy, who operates a dude ranch on the Minner and who was at Joseph and Wallawa Lake during recent seasons, has pictures of the Pacific Northwest which he has in past years already shown in Portland and Seattle schools. They have been commented on very favorably for their high educational value. These films include pictures of elk, deer, antelope, fishing scenes and wild life and nature pictures, as well as first hand reproduction of agricultural, lumber and livestock operations.

The donations approved by the chamber of commerce would allow Mr. McElroy to add the La Grande and Wallawa Lake scenes to his present showing before starting his projected southern trip.
