RECOGNITION OF RUSSIA IS OPPOSED

provided for by the London naval treaty. Definite action on this and other questions of national affairs, and the election of a new national commander, were all that remained for the national defenders in the World war to accomplish before adjourning to meet next year in Miami, Fla.

As the time for selecting a successor to National Commander Louis Johnson drew near, all seven of the candidates seeking his place declared they were still in the race, hopeful of success. They were Edward A. Hayes, of Illinois; George W. Malone, Nevada; Ray Murphy, Iowa; Samuel

Boyd, Nebraska; Gen. Milton A. Reckord, Maryland; Lyon Brandon, Mississippi, and Rufus Betha, of Alabama.

The legion's committee on foreign relations declared against the entrance of the United States into the league of nations or the world court, with or without reservations. Cancellation of war debts also was opposed.

They recommended however, the admission to membership in Fides, international league of former soldiers, of Russians who served with the allies.

A study of possible economies in government and support of the national recovery act, were among other committee recommendations, while another report warned against inflation without mature consideration and thought.

The black and red drum and bugle corps of Marlboro, Mass., marched out of the stadium victorious over 11 other finalists including the 1933 champions of Salem, Ore., eliminated with the Miami, Fla., and Seattle corps on a technicality.
