E. O. N. FOOTBALL GAME WILL BEGIN AT 2:30 O'CLOCK

Looking over his Eastern Oregon Normal school football squad this evening, with Lewiston Normal school scheduled to play here at 2:30 Friday afternoon Coach Bob Quinn expressed the belief he would have a stronger, smoother working team on the field tomorrow.
