Home Department In Meeting

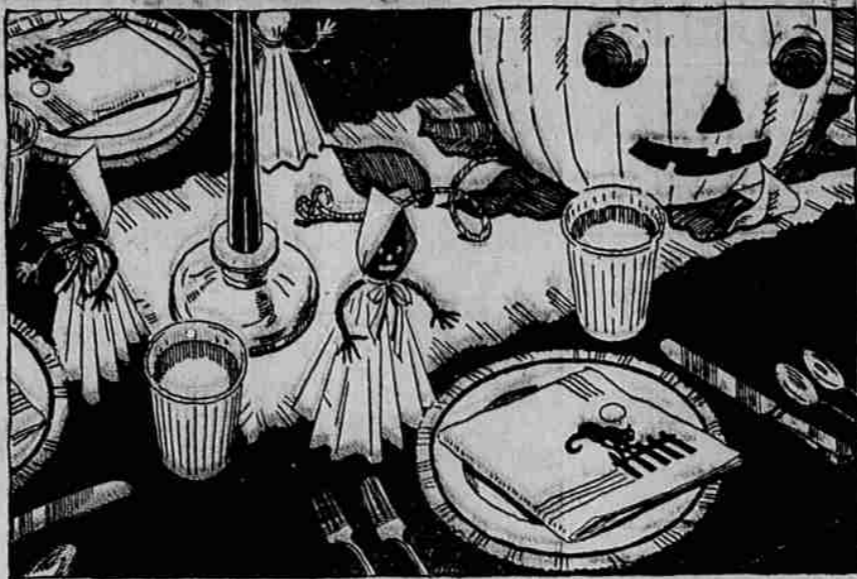
