Many Interesting Church Services Are Announced

Large Congregations Expected in La Grande Houses of Worship—Fine Sermons Scheduled

Programs for church services in La Grande next Sunday include the following:

Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington)
"Services are unpleasant when they are degrading in themselves, when they are performed to a worthless master, or when they do not yield sufficient recompense. But the Christian services are truly ennobling, they are performed to him whom angels delight to worship, and they are rewarded with the present riches of grace, and the eternal riches of glory," said Rev. J. George Walz, in announcing his sermon subject for Sunday morning, 11:00 o'clock, "The Highest Hour in the History of Man." The sermon precedes the holy communion. All not attending religious services elsewhere are cordially invited. The choir, Andrew Loney Jr., directing, will sing the morning anthem, "Mrs. Harley Richards" will preside at the organ console.

Splendid advantages for the study of the word of God are offered by the Sunday morning Bible school, meeting at 9:45 o'clock, to which invitation is extended to all ages. There is an after-noon interest and enthusiasm that points to better things. Christian Endeavorers are planning in many ways to offer the best in the training for Christian life and service to normal school young folks, high school groups, and others, during the fall-winter months. Sunday evening hour for young people, 8:00 o'clock, evening program for intermediates, 6:30 o'clock.

Zion English Lutheran Church (M avenue near Fourth)
The holy communion will be celebrated at the regular morning worship Sunday at 11:30 o'clock. The choir will be present to aid in the singing of the service, accompanied by Virginia Wurl. The pastor will speak briefly on the theme, "What is Truth?"

During the opening session of the Sunday school at 9:45 a. m. Marion Gehring will tell of the life and work of David A. Day, missionary of Africa. A silhouette likeness of Dr. Day will be placed on the frieze which the school is making. The Sunday school has as its goal 100 members, and invites parents to send their children each Sunday morning. Irma Schilling is leader for the Luther League meeting Sunday evening. During October the League is considering the general theme, "Winning Others." Sunday night they will discuss "The Master's Method," trying to discover how young people can help others to find God. Young people especially are invited.

St. Peter's Church (Episcopal) (Fourth street at O)
Services at this church Sunday open with holy communion at 8 a. m., followed by church school at 9:45 o'clock. Morning prayer with sermon is scheduled for 11 a. m. The Young People's Fellowship will meet at 6:30 p. m. in the chapel.

Central Church of Christ (Pennsylvania Avenue)
The Central Church of Christ is conducting a special ten weeks campaign aimed to strengthen the attendance at all services of the church. Last Sunday was the first of these services, and a splendid beginning was made. It is hoped that every service on Sunday will show an increase.

The Bible school is in a campaign to double its attendance record, and a number of the classes already have reached that goal. New supplies and re-organized classes add interest to the junior-intermediate department, and each department is making advances. Miss Dorothy Smutz is superintendent.

For the morning worship service at 11 o'clock, the pastor has announced a sermon on the subject, "More Than These." Rev. Mr. Mortimore is especially anxious to have every member of the church hear this sermon. Communion will be observed in the usual manner of Churches of Christ. A special anthem has been prepared by the choir. Christian Endeavor will be divided

into intermediate and senior groups, and young people of all ages are invited. These meetings are at 6:30 p. m. Interesting discussions and programs are provided.

The feature service of the day is at 7:30 p. m. when the pastor will preach a sermon on "God and The Depression." Mr. Mortimore has made a careful study of the history of depression, and has some very positive conclusions to present. Some of the questions he will raise in the sermon include: "Can Roosevelt bring lasting prosperity?" "What caused the depression, and when will it definitely end?" "What part had God in the present world crisis?" A musical program features the first 30 minutes of this service, with special features for children. The orchestra will play a short concert. The public is cordially invited to all these services.

Free and easy meetings every Saturday at 8 p. m.
Sunday school at 2:30 p. m. with salvation meetings at 8 p. m.
Prayer and praise meetings are held every Thursday at 8 p. m.
All are invited. Special music is provided at each service.

First Church of Christ, Scientist (First and Washington)
Services are held as follows: Sunday school 9:45 a. m., morning service 11 a. m., Wednesday evening meeting at 8 p. m.
The reading room in the West-Jacobson building is open daily from 1 to 4:30 p. m.
The subject of the Sunday service will be "Are Sin, Disease, and Death Real?"

The golden text is, "The kingdom of heaven is at hand. Heal the sick, cleanse the lepers, raise the dead, cast out devils; freely ye have received, freely give" (Matt. 10: 7, 8).
Among the citations which comprise the lesson-sermon is the following from the Bible: "All things were made by him; and without him was not anything made that was made" (John 1: 3).
The lesson-sermon also includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "In the Gospel of John, it is declared that all things were made through the Word of God, 'and without Him (the logos, or word) was not anything made that was made.' Everything that was made, 'Everything that was made, was made.' Everything good, or worthy, God made. Whatever is valueless or baneful, He did not make, hence its unreality. . . Sin, sickness and death must be deemed as devoid of reality as they are of good. God" (p. 625).
