NEW YORK, Oct. 6 (AP)—A late selling wave swept over the stock market today, when grains slumped around the full day's limit at Chicago, but liquidation dried up rapidly and many leaders either pared or cancelled their losses in a last-minute rally. The close was irregularly lower. Declines were the rule in the first hour and turnover approximated only 1,450,000 shares. Butter Make In Northwest Holds Up Well, Report

PORTLAND, Oct. 6 (AP)—Butter manufacture in the Pacific northwest was holding up better than during any recent season for like period. There continued a general increase of offerings from outstate points and even local manufacture was indicating a fractional gain for the week instead of the loss of normal periods. Demand for butter remained steady but prices on the open market were unchanged for the day. Best demand continued for undergrades which did not advance during a late session of the exchange. Advertisers low resale prices to consumers were usually of these grades. Butterfat prices were at least firm.

Lumber Shipments Above Production. SEATTLE, Oct. 6 (AP)—Lumber shipments of 114 mills for the week ending Sept. 30 were 93,055,074 feet, 14.3 per cent over production, while current sales were 88,125,568 feet or 6.36 per cent over the production of 81,323,312 feet, the West Coast Lumbermen's association reported today. Orders booked were 3 1/2 per cent higher than the week before. The unfiled order file stands at 280,129,188 feet, a decrease of 6,638,619 feet under the previous week.

OLD LIQUOR TAX Will Take Effect. WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (AP)—The bureau of internal revenue has dispatched to all of its collectors a memorandum setting forth taxes and duties which would become automatically effective upon the repeal of the 18th amendment. This shows a levy of \$1.10 a gallon on all distilled spirits with an additional 30-cent tax on rectified spirits. It places the tariff on distilled spirits at \$5 a gallon, the figure stipulated in the Smoot-Hawley law.

LA GRANDERS IN JOURNEY TO PONDOSA

Wauge, Lyle Kiddle, Francis Grulich, P. L. Robinson and Roy Farnham. The completion of the new highway from Pondosa to Union has brought Pondosa closer to La Grande and the hosts expressed their appreciation of the work of the La Grande chamber of commerce in promoting the highway.

The visitors found operations at the mill of extreme interest. The sawmill has a capacity of 8000 feet an hour and on the basis of two shifts' full time operation could produce 40 million feet per year. The logging is done entirely by truck, a type of logging in which the Pine company was one of the earliest pioneers many years ago.

It is not universally lower in cost than railroad logging, since it is primarily adapted to a topography involving short haul and steep favorable grades. Occasionally they bring logs down grades as steep as 30 per cent. With their large trucks they can handle adverse grades very nicely up to 4 per cent. The four and one-half mile main line truck road is one of the finest and most expensive of private logging track roads in this country.
