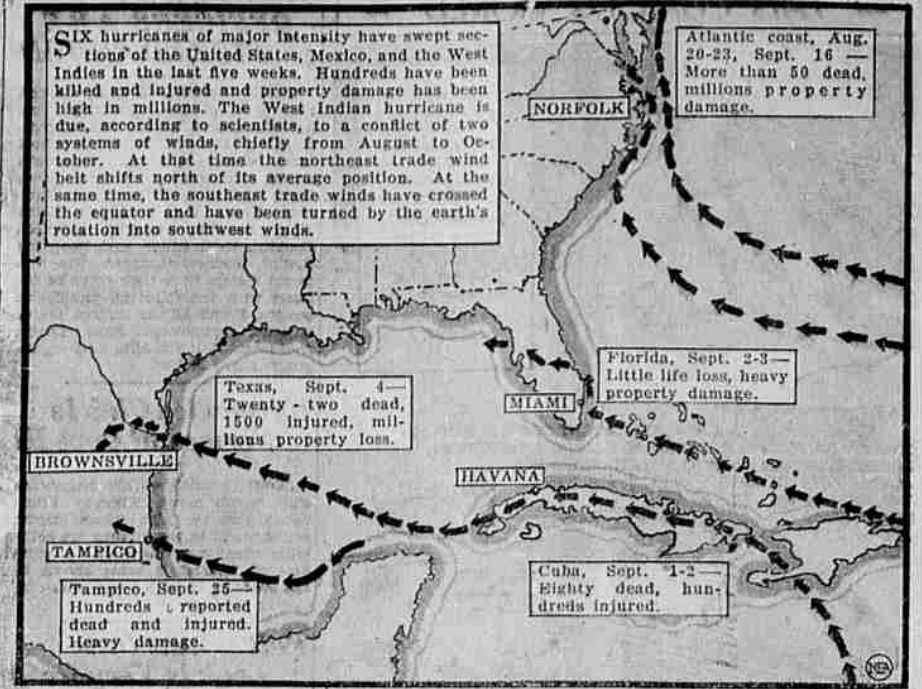

New System Of College Study To Reach Many North Dakota's New Capitol Is Near Completion

BISMARCK, N. D. (AP)—Now that its new cornerstone, hewn of native granite, has been placed, North Dakota's new \$2,000,000 state capital building is nearing completion after weathering controversy and labor trouble.

The original cornerstone-laying last December, attended by Vice President Charles Curtis, was criticized by the last state legislature as a "deceiving show." Since then souvenir hunters had damaged the first stone to make it unfit for use.

By legislative mandate a "fitting ceremony" was ordered for the unveiling of the new stone.

Since construction of the building was started two years ago, a legislative investigation and labor strikes interrupted its progress. The old commission resigned and a new one was appointed by the governor. In July a third commission came into existence under an act of the last legislature.

For a few days last June martial law was declared in Bismarck in connection with a strike of laborers employed on the project.

Since settlement of the strike work has progressed rapidly, with occupancy of some offices scheduled for October.

The 10-story building, tallest in North Dakota, overlooks the Missouri valley from Capitol Hill. It replaces the statehouse destroyed by fire in December, 1930.

ARKANSAS DRAWS LARGEST FOOTBALL SQUAD IN YEARS

New System Of College Study To Reach Many

EUGENE, Ore. (Special)—A new plan of college study, designed for those who cannot attend an institution of higher education this year as well as for those who wish to pursue cultural and enjoyable courses, has been devised by the correspondence division of the general extension division of the Oregon state system of higher education. It was announced here today by Miss Mabelle Hair, of the extension staff.

The new plan is known as "group study" and regular correspondence courses supplied by the extension division will be utilized. By forming groups of varying sizes in cities and of the state, students may greatly reduce the individual costs, yet have all the advantages of this increasingly popular type of study. Several groups have already been formed and many more will be organized during the year, it is reported.

Classes of five or more students may obtain a four-term-hour course at a reduction of \$2 per student. In classes of 10 or more the cost is reduced \$3 per student. Students in these groups may meet for discussions as frequently as they desire and are all to submit their lessons at the same time.

Wherever possible leaders, selected by the extension division for qualifications in the particular fields chosen, will be appointed, and in this way many of the advantages of campus instruction may be obtained.

Regular college or university credit may be earned by students in these groups. At the university and state college students are permitted to earn 9 term hours in group requirement and an additional 9 hours in other courses. The three groups for group requirement are language and literature, science and social science.

Correspondence courses are available in the following fields: astronomy, bird study, botany, business administration, drawing, economics, English, geology, health education, history, home economics, journalism, Latin, literature, mathematics, modern languages, physics, physiology, sociology, and some entrance subjects.

KNIFE-TOTING IN SCHOOLS BANNED FOR HITLER BOYS

BERLIN (AP)—Youngsters in the Hitler youth movement have been forbidden to wear weapons in schoolrooms by order of the Prussian ministry of education, but they have been given a half holiday weekly more than the non-members of the organization receive.

Most of the boys in the Hitler groups carry heavy hunting knives, the sale of which is restricted to members of the movement. The blades are six inches long and etched in the steel is the phrase: "Blut und Ehre" ("Blood and Honor").

FARMERS GET REVENUE TAXING DUCK HUNTERS

MOBILE, Ill. (AP)—Farmers along the Mississippi and Rock rivers will check duck hunters through wire gates to the wasteland at so much a head this fall.

MAIN DISHES FOUNDED ON CHEESE

There comes a day in most families when the food budget suffers because of some unexpected expenditure in one of the other household departments. To the housewife this means living just a bit more economically. And to those who have a sound foundation in nutrition, some shortcuts in the meal planning will mean a saving. In this "new deal," cheese plays an important part, as a basis for inexpensive, but exceedingly tasty main dishes.

Cheese is a concentrated source of the solids found in milk and is therefore, high in protein, minerals, energy and vitamin value. Because of these dietetic values, cheese greatly augments the food value of the vegetable dishes. Some recipes containing vegetables and cheese are:

Baked Corn and Cheese
2 tablespoons of butter.
1 tablespoon of minced onion.
2 tablespoons of minced green pepper.

2 tablespoons of flour.
1 1/2 cups of milk.
1 1/2 cups of corn.
1 cup of diced cheese.
1/2 teaspoon of salt.
1/4 teaspoon of paprika.
2 eggs.

1 tablespoon of grated cheese.
Melt butter and cook onion and pepper in it for three minutes. Add flour, and when blended add milk, stir until mixture thickens. Add corn, diced cheese, seasonings and beaten egg yolks. Fold in stiffly beaten whites, turn into a large baking dish, or into 6 small dishes, sprinkle grated cheese over top and bake in a moderate oven—350 F.—30 to 35 minutes for large dish, or 15 to 20 minutes in small dishes.

Carrot Ring
2 cups of cooked shredded carrots.
1 1/2 cups of grated American cheese.
2 eggs.
1 cup milk.
1 cup of bread crumbs.
Salt and pepper.

Thoroughly drain the cooked, shredded carrots, add grated cheese, beaten eggs, milk, crumbs, and seasonings to taste. Pour into a well-buttered ring mold. Bake in a pan of hot water, in a moderate oven, about one hour or until firm. Unmold at once and serve hot.

Cheese and Celery Loaf
1-3 cup of elbow macaroni, cooked.
4 cups of diced celery, cooked.
1 medium sized onion, minced.
2 cups of cubed cheese.
2 cups of hot medium cream sauce.
Salt and pepper.
1/2 cup of bread crumbs.

Mix together macaroni, celery and onion. Add cheese to cream sauce and cook until cheese is melted. Mix with other ingredients, and season. Pour into a greased casserole and cover with bread crumbs. Bake in a moderately hot oven—375 F.—twenty minutes. For variety substitute tomato sauce for the cream.

Columbus Day Is Being Observed In Many States

NEW YORK, Oct. 12 (AP)—An ocean voyage made centuries ago was the inspiration for holiday observance in many parts of the nation today. It was the journey on which Christopher Columbus, obscure Genoan seafarer, sailed his way into immortal fame as the discoverer of a new continent.

Today—the 551st anniversary of the discovery of America—was marked by celebrations and festivities principally by Italian societies honoring their worthy ancestor. Knights of Columbus also joined in the observance.

The day was a bank holiday in some states, including Oregon, and financial markets in some of the larger trading centers were closed, including the New York stock exchange.

INVENTOR 'LISTENS IN' TO HOUSEFLIES' 'TALK'

HELSINGFORS (AP)—Communication between two houseflies has been registered by a new type of sound-camera, says its inventor, Schwell Larsen, a young Norwegian student, who demonstrated at the Northern Entomological congress in Oslo.

The apparatus is so sensitive that it is able to register the beating of a fly's wings, even if they are moving at the rate of 10,000 beats a minute. The inventor stated he had successfully "listened in" to insects that conversed by rubbing their feelers one against another.

MORE JAPANESE ENTER BRAZIL
SAO PAULO, Brazil (AP)—The Japanese immigration society reports that it brought 13,816 settlers to the state of Sao Paulo in the first six months of 1933. The society has a contract with the federal government, which has several years to run.
