

# La Grande Eleven Leaves For The Dalles

## TIGERS TO TAKE ON STRONG FOE IN FRIDAY GAME

Twenty-four La Grande High school football players, accompanied by Coach Ira Woodie, left this afternoon to meet The Dalles in an inter-district game at The Dalles tomorrow afternoon. In fairly fair shape, the Tigers were figured as the underdogs in the game with the Indians, probably two or three touchdowns.

The Blue and White players and their coach, however, refused to admit The Dalles had any edge. Encouraged by the 41 to 7 victory over Blue-7. They had high hopes of upsetting the foe based all over the turf field at The Dalles.

Adding to their hopes was the fact that Bert Hodgen, The Dalles coach, was having a few worries about his ends, following injuries sustained in the Astoria game.

The following is from The Dalles: The Indian football squad will present a considerably altered forward wall to Ira Woodie's organization from La Grande when it meets the Tiger team here next Friday afternoon.

Injuries incurred during last week's fray with Astoria have depleted the Indians supply of usable wing material down to the point where Coach Bert Hodgen, bothered about his ends all season, may have to make some fairly drastic shifts in his line-up to strengthen the outside posts.

Eddie Howell, the only consistent end Hodgen has had, was taken out of the Astoria game with a cracked shoulder and will be on the bench for a month.

With the hole left by Howell's temporary absence from the lineup and not much to count on among other squad members who have been trying for the end position, Hodgen has a plan to shift Capt. Millard Heath from tackle to replace Howell. Heath's play in last week's contest was outstanding and Hodgen thinks he may do well at end.

Ernie Moser will also be shifted from guard to fill in opposite Heath, Hodgen thinks.

Willie Cramlett, Jack Camp, Stein and Kenny Orent, all capable reserves, are being eyed as possibilities for filling the gaps in the front line that would be left by Heath's and Moser's removal to the outside.

Such an arrangement would give the Indians good ends during opportunity periods of the game and if the reserve men weaken the line to any considerable degree, the regulars could be shifted back into their old positions and other men used for ends. The Astoria game demonstrated that the Indians can get along without very much help from their wings.

## OREGON STATERS WILL TACKLE SAN FRANCISCO TEAM

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 12.—With few days of practice before they board trains for the San Francisco university football game in San Francisco Saturday, Oregon State football players have been busy since Monday perfecting their offense, which has clicked only occasionally this year. The Orangemen have held opponents scoreless in four games but failed to gain better than a scoreless tie with Oregon last weekend.

To give his players a varied offense, Lon Stiner, Orange coach, plans to develop a passing attack and smashing power in his line plays to go with a dangerous running offense. Norman Franklin has been hard to stop on end runs and off-tackle plays, but no Orange back has been able to gain consistently through the line.

Hal Joslin, who has been hindered by a leg injury, is expected to be in shape for the San Francisco game. Joslin not only is a driving fullback but is one of the best interference runners on the team. While Joslin was out of the lineup, Arnold Heikonen stepped into the berth and showed promise offensively but was not too strong on blocking and tackling.

Although he is fast enough to fit into the running plays nicely, Ford McIntosh, who tips the scales at 197 pounds, may be called on to do a lot of line smashing. At times McIntosh has shown impressively but has not been consistent.

In an effort to give his line greater power, Coach Stiner may send Vic Curtin, two-year letterman left end, and Harry Field, letterman left tackle, to the second string. If this is done Woodie Joslin, a sophomore, will be shifted from right end to replace Curtin, while Maynard Schultz, another sophomore, will take right end. Don Wagner, one-year letterman, who has been improving rapidly, may replace Field.

## Jimmy Foxx Gets "Most Valuable Player" Trophy

NEW YORK, Oct. 12 (AP)—James Jimmy Foxx, the home run king of the major leagues, was named by the baseball experts today as the American league's "most valuable player" for the second successive year.

Only two other stars in either league have ever gained this extraordinary distinction. Walter Johnson, when he was the "Big Train" of Washington's pitching staff, captured the award in 1918 and repeated in 1924 the year he helped the Senators win their first world series. Rogers Hornsby won the National league "most valuable player" contest in 1925 and repeated in 1929.

## Skater Claims Endurance Mark

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 12 (AP)—W. W. Miller, 74, at 1:25 this morning claimed he tied the reported world's continuous roller skating record of 100 hours and 25 minutes. He continued skating in a Tacoma rink on toward a new 200-hour record he has set for himself.
