Poor Dad! Shall We Buy Him Some Lace? AKRON, O., Oct. 14 (AP)— Although qualifying his statement, Dr. Oliver Kamm, of Detroit, says "It is entirely within the realm of possibility" that "fathers soon will be nursing their babies."

He spoke before the Ohio-Michigan section of the American Chemical Society, adding that he didn't want to make an out and out prediction concerning the fathers "from this platform."

Dr. Kamm announced the discovery of an extract of the posterior pituitary gland, a single injection of which "will stimulate the lactal glands of mothers" and permit any mother in normal health to nurse her babies at the breast.

Experiments with cats, he said, showed the gland extract enabled tom cats to nurse kittens.
