TOP NOTCH CARD SCHEDULED FOR ARMISTICE DAY

Ah Wing Lee, Chinese fighter who has been the talk of northwest fight circles for the last year, will make his initial appearance in La Grande the evening of Armistice day, Nov. 11, in a match with Frankie Monroe, tough Klamath Falls brawler.

The fight card will begin at 8 o'clock in the Sacajawea Inn, moderated by Leo McCarthy and Martin Fitzgerald and under the auspices of the American Legion.

Ah Wing Lee and Monroe will meet in the 10-round main event of a four or five bout card, the other bouts to be announced later.

I-O-N HIGHWAY GIVEN APPROVAL OF COMMISSION

SALEM, Ore., (AP)—The Oregon state highway department has completed the survey of the Oregon section of the route known as the Idaho, Oregon and Nevada highway and the commission has allocated \$50,000 of federal public lands highway funds for construction work. It was announced by the highway department here.

The public lands fund would be used in construction of 15 or 20 miles of the stretch from McDermitt, Nevada, north of Scotts Butte, six miles south and 10 miles west of Rome in Malheur county. An additional \$10,000 or \$15,000 will be spent by the state in building the route over private lands, the road having been designated a secondary highway for that purpose.

The I-O-N road in Oregon is all in Malheur county. From Scotts Butte, the survey shows, the road will run northeast to a crossing of Jordan creek west of the mouth of Hooker creek. Thence it will run northeast to the Idaho line near Malloy's ranch, 20 miles north of Jordan valley, following the secondary highway toward Nyssa. It will follow the Squaw creek drainage in Idaho to the Old Oregon Trail connection at Marsing, Idaho.

Coach Bob Quinn, accompanied by 22 stalwart Eastern Oregon Normal school football men, left here about 9 o'clock this morning for Lewiston, Ida., to play the Lewiston Normal school teachers a return game tomorrow afternoon. By reason of their 38 to 0 win over Lewiston here Oct. 14, the Mountaineers are heavy favorites to repeat.

Pete Miles, flashy The Dalles halfback, who scored three of the six touchdowns against Lewiston earlier this month, was with the travelling squad but there was little chance he would get into the game. To offset his loss, however, was the addition of Chris Lassen to the squad either in a fullback or blocking halfback role—whatever the occasion demands.

Quinn expects to start the following lineup tomorrow: Bredow and Hanks, ends; H. Heyden and Berney, tackles; J. Heyden and Pearson, quarterbacks; Owsley, center; Burnett, halfbacks; Hodgen, fullback. terest of its bonds. Warrants outstanding as of June 20 (the beginning of the school year) totalled \$63,204.66 and bonds \$92,000. During the current year the bonded indebtedness will be reduced to \$80,000.

Total expenses amount to \$168,996.96 and receipts, including \$1935.24 cash on hand at the beginning of the year, total \$40,416, leaving the special school tax levy at \$128,580.96.

The budget items, with reductions and increases, follow:
General control \$6600, which is \$945 less than last year; instruction (supervision) \$5253, which is \$627 less; instruction (teaching) \$82,722, which is \$10,419 less; operation of plant \$15,400, which is \$110 less; maintenance and repairs \$2850, which is \$313 less; auxiliary agencies \$1200, which is \$75 less; fixed charges \$4000, which is \$1000 less; capital outlays \$1024, which is \$1065 less; debt service \$49,147.96, which is \$11,944.54 more than last year; emergency \$1000, which is \$7201.44 less than last year.

The school board was not required to include in the budget the cost of rebuilding the La Grande High school, wrecked by fire in September, 1932, as this was paid out of insurance received.
