North Atlantic Air Line Plan May Be Dropped

LONDON, Oct. 20 (AP)—Prospects of a North Atlantic air line via Greenland next year faded today as British aviation experts discussed the results of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh's arctic survey as disclosed to them by the American airman. From their conversations with the pilot, now on a visit here with his wife, the experts have reached the conclusion that Lindbergh's summer survey led to his forming the opinion that summer service offers no difficulties which could not be overcome. The idea of winter service, however, is considered out of the question.

66 Persons Feared Killed in Typhoon

KOBE, Japan, Oct. 20 (AP)—Sixty-six persons, including an English woman, were feared to have perished today when the coastwise steamer Yashima Maru foundered in a typhoon off Suma, near here.

Owners of the vessel said their figures showed that of the crew of 58 and 59 passengers, 51 survivors had been reported.

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Oregon Normal School Elevens All See Action

All three normal schools in Oregon are taking on gridiron opponents today, two of them playing in Oregon and one in Idaho. The Eastern Oregon Normal school, so far undefeated and unscathed on two games played, is meeting the Lewiston Normal school team at Lewiston, Ida., this afternoon. The Mountaineers, with a 38 to 0 victory over the Idahoans scored earlier this season, are expected to make it three straight wins.

Invading Corvallis, the Southern Oregon Normal school, having lost only to Oregon State college and with a victory over Larry Wolfe's Monmouth crew, is taking on the Oregon State Books, hoping to even up the count with the state college for the season. Monmouth, with losses to Williamette and the Sons, coached by Howard and Hobson, is meeting St. Martin's college, a Washington state team, which is reported to have an aggressive, tough team this season.

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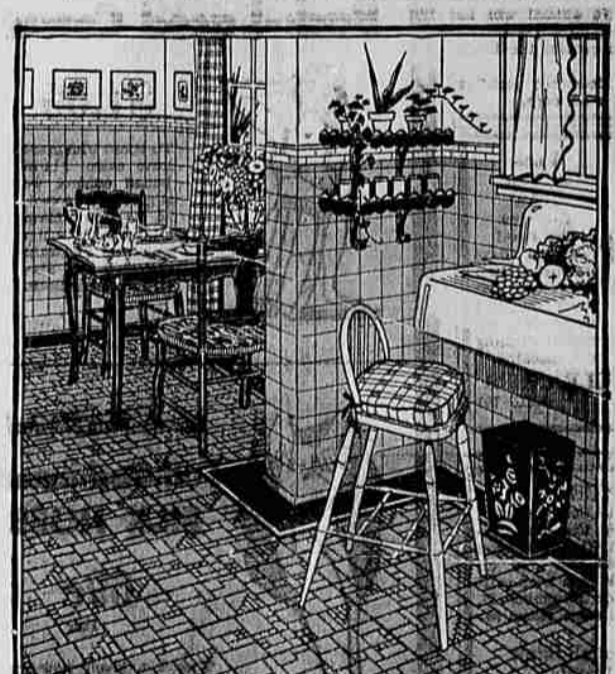
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
