PRIMO CARNERA DEFENDS TITLE

ROME, Oct. 23 (AP)—Primo Carnera's first heavyweight title defense, successful though it was, added little to the mammoth Italian's prestige in his native land today. A crowd of 70,000 straggle predicted in Carnera's favor, watched the huge champion to punch out a decisive 15-round victory over Paulino Uzcudun yesterday, cheered him just for a while and then booed him just as heartily in the last two rounds for his failure to stop the 34-year-old Spanish veteran of more than ten years' warfare against the world's best heavyweights.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23 (AP)—Stocks pushed forward vigorously today in response to the president's gold control plan, although the rally had little appearance of a "boom" market. Metal issues led the recovery, but all groups participated in the advance. Late profit taking shaded early gains, but the close was firm. Transfers approximated 2,100,000 shares.

his pupils at the Island. Mrs. U. G. Couch has received a story recently concerning his visit at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Elsie Couch Smith at Oakland, Cal. Because the story tells of some of the things he has done since he was in the Grande Ronde valley, we repeat part of the story which goes as follows: Dr. W. L. Shurz, associate in research in political science at the University of California will be the speaker. The material for his talk will be taken from his experience in the American foreign service. In 1919, he was with the trade commission of the Department of Interior investigating economic conditions in Paraguay and Bolivia. From 1920 to 1925 he was attached to the foreign embassy at Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. During 1923 and 1924, he was on an expedition investigating crude rubber for the Department of the Interior in the Amazon valley. From 1926-1927 he acted as economic adviser to the government of Cuba, and since has been editorial and feature writer for the New York Herald-Tribune.
