gun, but Mrs. Potter armed herself with this weapon and proceeded to wound the bear, which had by this time killed one of the sheep. She fired three shots into the bear, but failed to inflict a fatal wound. Meredith Roberts, a 14-year-old school boy, attracted by the shooting, ran to a nearby home where he seized a larger caliber rifle. His first shot inflicted another wound, and the bear turned and charged toward Mrs. Potter, but the boy's second shot stopped the rush, and Mrs. Potter, at close range, fired the final and fatal bullet.

The excitement furnished a partial holiday for the pupils of the Rice Creek school, as the teacher and students had rushed out to view the shooting and were too excited to return to the humdrum of study and recitations.

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
