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Denver Employes Win Judgment In NRA Court Case

DENVER (AP) — Two Denver employes won a judgment in district court here in what is believed to be the first case involving an employer's NRA agreement.

The action was based on the agreement signed by Major Avondale, restaurant owner, and the president of the United States.

"Avondale's contract with the president was made for the benefit of third parties—his employes—and they are entitled to the full benefit under it," District Judge Frank McDonough said.

He awarded a judgment of \$107 to Kenneth Beaton for himself and for Warren T. Williams, waiters in Avondale's cafe, for wages.

The complainants did not take their case to the local NRA compliance board, but instead appealed to the district court on the grounds they were entitled to a judgment for breach of contract.

Judge McDonough held that inasmuch as Avondale had signed a contract with President Roosevelt to pay

a certain scale of wages, he must abide by the contract, and that the complainants were entitled to allowances based on the contract scale of wages.
