## Local Churches Plan Programs For Next Sunday

Many Interesting Church Services Scheduled in La Grande and Nearby Community.

Church programs in houses of worship in La Grande and vicinity for next Sunday include the following:

**First Presbyterian Church** (Sixth and Washington)  
The minister, Rev. J. George Walk, in announcing the Sunday service of this church, says: "We owe an obligation and duty to God and our companions in life: to God to worship him, and to our companions that we worship with them. Our worship on Sunday morning with others is our deferential acknowledgment of God's superior power and our desire to be of help to others. Why not set apart the 11-00 o'clock hour in which we shall show forth our loyalty and devotion, obedience and respect?" The choir, Andrew Loney directing, will sing the morning anthem. There will be other special and congregational music and song. Mr. Walz will bring sermon message II on "The Church" using for his theme "The Pillar and Ground of Truth."

The lesson-sermon also includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Do you ask wisdom to be merciful and not to punish sin? Then 'ye ask amiss.' Without punishment, sin would multiply. . . . The way to escape the misery of sin is to cease sinning. There is no other way.
