

STINER TO START HIS 11 REGULARS AGAINST COUGARS

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 27 (AP)—With Pierre Bowman, Hawaiian right halfback, captaining the same lineup that went 60 minutes against Southern California last week, the Oregon State college football team will open up with its greatest strength Saturday when Washington State college comes here in an attempt to add to its string of five straight victories over the Beavers.

Several offensive plays in which the Oregon Staters have been drilled, probably will be seen against the Cougars for the first time, as the Trojan zero-tie game gave O. S. C. little opportunity to open up with a scoring offense.

All the Oregon Staters are in top condition except Tomscheck, left guard, who is in the hospital with a slight infection. He, however, is listed to start the game.

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 27 (AP)—With its newfound passing attack polished to perfection, the Washington State college football team entrained last night for Corvallis.

A stiff workout Thursday afternoon closed practice here, but a light workout is on the program for this afternoon at Corvallis.

Since Monday Coach O. E. Hollingbery has drilled the Cougars on an open running attack and the passing game, which clicked magnificently against the University of California here last Saturday.

It appeared probable that the team of Sorboe and Christoffersen would be depended upon to carry much of the passing. Christoffersen's injured shoulder apparently has healed, and he is in better condition than on last Saturday. Then he nailed five out of six passes, and his defensive work was one of the reasons California's burly line was not anymore effective than it was.

Grove Sold To Boston? Connie Denies Any Sale

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27 (AP)—The Washington Post said today that Robert Moses (Lefty) Grove, star of the Philadelphia Athletics pitching staff, has been sold to the Boston Red Sox.

While details of the trade were lacking, it was said to be an outright purchase by the Boston club with reports that Max Bishop, veteran infielder, and another pitcher will be included by Manager Connie Mack in shipment to Boston. The cash return to the Athletics was estimated at \$200,000.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 27 (AP)—Connie Mack today denied a report that he had sold "Lefty" Grove to the Boston Red Sox for \$200,000. "That's a very nice offer to dispose of my players," said the manager of the Athletics.

ASK DEMPSEY TO GIVE TROPHY FOR BOXING TOURNEY

The fight fans greatest fistic idol, Jack Dempsey, former world's heavyweight champion, has been invited to put up a special trophy for the aspiring ringmen to compete for in the Eagles big relief fund benefit N. B. A. championship amateur boxing tournament to be offered on the Eagles hall field of honor here the nights of Nov. 21, 22 and 23, it became known today.

Noted for being interested in helping the beginner in boxing gets a start up the pugilistic highway, Dempsey is expected to accept the invitation and hang up a trophy for the winner of the heavyweight title here or for the most popular champion of the big meet.

The tourney fights will be for three 2-minute rounds, with beginners competing against beginners and amateurs with previous experience competing against each other. Some 15 to 20 bouts will make up the card on each night of the fistic revival. An expert trainer will be in charge of giving the instructions, the Eagles report.
