Early State History Bared

Days of Whig Party Recalled by Paper

The recent publication by General Petroleum Corporation of its annual number of the Goshen Center Bugle, distributed free through all General service stations, has brought to light a rare copy of one of the most famous publications in the early political history of California.

The publication was the Bugle, published under the direction of the Whig State Central Committee. The copy forwarded to General Petroleum headquarters, is dated September 7, 1852, and is No. 2 of Volume 1. The editorial masthead carries the information that it was "issued semi-weekly, at No. 125 Montgomery street, near Sacramento, upstairs."

Back in September 1852, 81 years ago, both the federal and state political pots were boiling. Those were the days in which there were not just two political parties, but half-a-dozen. There were Whigs, Democrats and Republicans, Hunkers, Barnburners, Free Soilers, Abolitionists and Interventionists,

Unionists, Secessionists and Tariffites. And if politics today is a rough-and-tumble affair, in those days it was a knock-down-and-drag-out.

The Whig nomination that year for the Presidency was General Winfield Scott, and for Vice-President, William A. Graham of North Carolina. Primary issues in the campaign were the battles for and against free soil and the abolition of slavery. Enrolled in the Whig party were some of the best known names in California, representative of families which still are prominent in the affairs of this state. Presidential electors in 1852 were D. H. Haskell, of San Francisco; John C. Fall, of Yuba; J. E. Hale, of Placer; and Thomas D. Johns, of San Diego. Candidates for Congress were George B. Tingley, of Santa Clara, and Philip L. Edwards, of Sacramento.

Unlike the original Bugle, the Goshen Center Bugle published by General Petroleum has no political angles, being devoted entirely to humor and the sales promotion of the company's various products.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP) — The treasury today announced a price of \$32.26 an ounce for reconstruction corporation purchases of newly mined gold. This was an advance of 14 cents as compared with yesterday, and another new high.

Meanwhile the dollar value of gold at London increased from \$31.05 to \$31.52 an ounce, a margin of 47 cents.

Today's domestic price was 74 cents above the world figure.

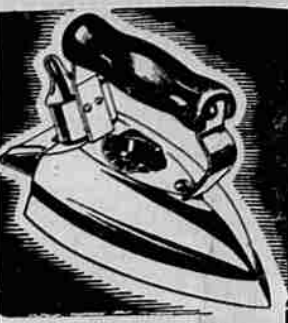
