

Pay Tribute To Mrs. Mossman As Church Leader

A high tribute to Mrs. E. P. Mossman, who died last week at McMinnville, appeared in the Oregonian the other day. Mrs. Mossman was, for many years, a resident here where many friends mourn her demise.

The tribute: "To the Editor: The many oldtime friends and associates of the late Mrs. Cornelia B. Mossman are not content to have her name slide away into the archives of memory without further tribute to her sterling character and fine executive ability."

Well known as a leader in the development of art and art appreciation in Oregon, she was widely known throughout Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Southeastern Alaska for her untiring efforts in forwarding the cause of missions.

Treasurer of the North Pacific Presbyterian Board of Missions for several years, she had no peer. With contributions from 150 women's societies, from Christian Endeavor societies, Sunday schools and mission bands—designated as general, special and contingent—it was no small task to keep figures in the right place.

The late W. R. Mackenzie, an expert accountant, was the board's auditor. He said the books were the most complicated he had ever handled but the annual audit found no errors.

Upon the death of Mrs. W. S. Ladd, the devoted and untiring president of the board for 20 years, Mrs. Mossman was elected to the position. Needless to say, she filled it with dignity, grace and skill.

It is said, "How soon we are forgotten when we drop out of active work." True, but this is one name that should be associated with missionary work in the northwest, and one never to be forgotten.

Spurious Stocks Flood New York, Officers State

NEW YORK (AP)—Aided by unwitting federal government propaganda, spurious gold mining stocks are flooding New York. Ambrose V. McCall, chief of the bureau of securities at the state attorney general's office, has declared.

Promoters of the fraudulent certificates are utilizing activities of the government in encouraging gold mining and offering premiums for new gold as attractive selling points, he said.

"The hardest thing we have to combat is the federal propaganda," McCall said. "They even make movies of gold mining and have them shown around."
