NEW DIESEL CATERPILLARS ARRIVE HERE

Bunting Tractor company, dealer for "Caterpillar" tractors in this area, has just received a shipment of the new "Caterpillar" Diesel tractors for display here, the first of this type ever shown in La Grande. The tractor has been on the market for quite some time but demand has taken the entire factory output until just recently.

Some idea of the popularity of the Diesel tractor may be gained from sales in this area to date. Within the past 14 months, 15 "Caterpillar" Diesel tractors have been delivered in Eastern Oregon and Southern Idaho, according to officials of the Bunting company.

The Diesel tractor is very similar in appearance to the "Caterpillar" tractors using gasoline for fuel, but burns ordinary furnace oil costing less than half the prevailing price for gasoline, which accounts for its popularity.
