

### IMBLER SCHOOL BUDGET PASSED

IMBLER, Ore. (Special)—The budget for school district number 11, Imbler, was favorably approved at the meeting of the taxpayers Monday, Nov. 6. The new budget shows a reduction of \$2,432.30 over last year's budget, disregarding debt service. This item is slightly higher due to delinquent taxes and estimated receipts are slightly less, reducing the savings in district tax to be raised of \$753.43 over last year's budget. A summary of the budget shows:

Estimated expenses \$19,020.00  
 Estimated receipts 10,001.00  
 Balance, to be raised by dist. tax 9,019.00

It was pointed out by the school board that the district was really in good financial condition in spite of the large warrant indebtedness as this district holds warrants against the county high school tuition fund sufficient to take up practically all of last year's warrant indebtedness. The inability to cash these warrants has placed an extra burden on this district.
