

Prize Contest For E.O.N. Song Will be Tonight

A prize contest to provide words for an E. O. N. fight song for which D. W. Hall has furnished the music will be held tonight at the Liberty theatre after the first performance, about 8:45 o'clock. The stanzas that will be judged have been written by Normal school students. A total of 120 entries, including those from Miss Amanda Zabel's English classes, have submitted songs from which the favorites were chosen this morning by the student body.

Copies of the three chosen by student acclamation have been furnished to C. M. Wright, manager of the Liberty. Mr. Hall and the three judges, tonight they will be shown on the screen at the theatre, played by Mr. Hall, the organist, and sung by a group of Normal school students and any others who wish to join the singing. The judges will decide on the respective merits of the three stanzas tonight.

First, second and third prizes will be awarded, the first being \$5 in cash, the second a two week's free admission ticket to the Liberty and the third a one week's free admission ticket.

Normal school students will be admitted two for one admission.

\$950,000 RELIEF MONEY RECEIVED

SALEM, Nov. 9 (AP) — Governor Julius L. Meier said the federal relief administration kept its end of the bargain by allotting \$950,000 yesterday for relief purposes in Oregon until the legislature can provide relief match money.

Harry L. Hopkins, federal relief administrator, advised the governor that "payments under this grant will be made upon condition that definite action be taken in bearing the costs of unemployment relief will be taken by the legislature at its special session."

"This grant, along with federal allotments of food and other supplies, means that we shall be able to take care of our relief needs for November and December so that want and suffering shall be averted in Oregon," the governor said.

Better Headwork If Quarter Runs Team Says Ingram

BERKELEY, Cal. (AP) — Although probably nine out of ten prep schools of the state use the huddle system instead of having the quarterback call the football signals, it is claimed this year that Coach Bill Ingram's three first string quarterbacks at California came from schools which did not employ the huddle.

"Navy Bill" announced he would abandon the huddle, believing a more colorful and strategic game would result if the quarterback ran the team. The huddle was to be used only when the quarter wished to consult.

Confirmation of the improvement in "headwork," Ingram believes, was had in the game with the Olympic club, won by the Golden Bears, 23 to 0.

Turk Prices Down To 15 Cents Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9 (AP) — Further reduction in the price offered turkey producers and for re-sales, brought birds of leading buyers to 15 cents a pound for dressed No. 1 turkeys and hens at country points today. This quotation was net to producer, with one cent added for Portland delivery.

This price is from 2 to 3 cents below what was offered at this time a year ago.

PORTLAND BUTTER PRICE PROTESTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9 (AP) — E. L. Martindale, president of the Portland produce exchange, today directed a telegram of protest to the secretary of agriculture because the dairy marketing corporation has established coast market prices on butter 1 1/2 cents a pound below the Chicago market.

The corporation was designed to relieve the butter surplus through purchases for government account. It had been understood by officials here that the Portland price would be that quoted by Chicago.
