

TOUGH BOY WILL THROW GLOVES IN BOXING TOURNEY

More ventilation has been arranged for the comfort of the spectators and the boxers at the training quarters of the local amateurs in the Armory building. A decision to increase ventilation was reached after hundreds of spectators jammed the gym last night.

This city's "tough boy" giant lumber man, Big Jess Phillips, has signed to fight in the heavyweight division of the Eagles great relief fund benefit championship amateur boxing tournament in Eagles hall here the nights of Nov. 21, 22 and 23. He weighs 195 pounds and his friends believe him to be the strongest in Union county.

Phillips is confident he will maintain his way into possession of the heavyweight title of the big meet. "All I know about this fight business is to start throwing 'em from the floor, but as far as the other heavyweights entered in the tourney are concerned they could put us all in a room, look the door, and I'd make the rest crawl out through the key-hole," roared Big Jess as he laced a shoe following a brisk workout last night. And he meant it, too.

Two-Bing Plan Loses The huge crowd on hand last night voted down the two-bing plan for nights of the tourney and the Eagles officials today were going forward with plans of presenting all of the sensational milling in one ring instead. From 15 to 20 wild-eyed fights will be offered each night of the tourney.

TRAIN AT 7 TONIGHT In order that the contestants who wish to do so may get away for the high school rally, there is to be no calisthenics and the boxing part of tonight's free public workout is to get under way at promptly 7. The gym is to be well ventilated.

Tonight's workout is the last public session of the La Grande amateurs until Monday night when they start into the last week of training in preparation for their wild and exciting titular bouts with the out-of-town amateurs. The locals are to train behind closed doors tomorrow, while on Sunday they are to do only light work at home.

Reports from the out-of-town training camps indicate the outside huskies, too, are working like Trojans pepping up for the big fray here. On nights of the tourney the first fight is to start at 8:15 and the last struggle is to end not later than 10:30.

Despite sogginess of the event most popular prices will prevail for the hostilities on the three nights of the tourney when the La Grande amateurs make a valiant attempt to blast their way to victory over the invading foe.
